Flag of Truce from the Rebels. HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, December 6. A flag of truce appeared yesterday in front of the 2d division of the 2d corps, bearing a dispatch addressed to Generals Gregg, Humphreys and Foster.

Flag of Truce from General Hood. An Exchange of Prisoners Asked for. ATTACK ON BLOCKHOUSES REPULSED.

Six Guns and Some Prisoners Taken from the Rebels. NASHVILLE, Dec. 6. Very little of interest transpired yesterday. Artillery and skirmishing continued throughout the day.

Very little of interest transpired yesterday. Artillery and skirmishing continued throughout the day. The daily routine was varied by the receipt of a flag of truce sent by Gen. Hood, which was received by our pickets on the Franklin pike at about 11 A. M.

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT TENNESSEE AND GEORGIA, IN THE FIELD, Dec. 5, 1864. - To the Commanding Officer United States Forces, Nashville, Tennessee. - General: I have now in my possession a large number of Federal prisoners, captured during the recent campaign, which I propose to exchange with you for an equal number of Confederate prisoners belonging to this army.

Should you agree to this proposition an officer on my staff will meet any one you may designate upon the Franklin pike between the lines of the two armies, to arrange the time, place and other necessary details connected with this exchange.

To which request General Thomas sent the following reply: HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF THE CUMBERLAND, Dec. 5. - General Hood, Commanding Confederate forces on the Franklin Road. - General: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of this date, making a proposition for the exchange of prisoners of the Army of the United States, now in your possession, for a like number of Confederate prisoners belonging to your army in my hands.

In reply I have to state that although I have had quite a large number of prisoners from your army, they have all been sent North, and are consequently now beyond my control. I am, therefore, unable to make the exchange proposed by you.

Yesterday a body of rebels attacked blockhouses Nos. six and seven, near Murfreesboro'. They were gallantly fought by the garrison, and soon a body of troops, sent by Milroy from Murfreesboro', arrived, who attacked the rebels with such effect that they were driven off in confusion, leaving six guns and a number of prisoners.

All sorts of rumors prevailed in the city when the news got abroad that a flag of truce had come in. The general supposition was that Hood had demanded a surrender of the city.

Generals Milroy and Rousseau are at Murfreesboro', which is amply garrisoned and defended against any rebel force which may attack it.

Matters at the front to-day are quieter than usual. No artillery that can be seen has been placed in position by the rebels. Hood's headquarters are said to be at Blentwood, six miles north of this city on the Franklin Pike.

XXXVIIIth Congress--Second Session SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7. Mr. Lane, of Indiana, introduced a bill to authorize the holding of a special session of the United States District Court of Indiana, which was ordered to be laid upon the table until the announcement of the committee, and then to be referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Mr. Morrill (Maine) presented a bill to extend the time for the completion of the Metropolitan railroad of Washington city two years. Ordered to be laid on the table.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Blaine (Me.) said the House yesterday referred to the Committee of Ways and Means the bills of the gentleman from Pennsylvania (Mr. Stevens) to prevent gold and silver coin and bullion from being paid or accepted for a greater value than their real or current value, and for preventing any note or bill issued by the United States from being received for a smaller sum than is therein specified.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 7. The advance in the price of gold has had no effect on the breadstuf market, and there is very little doing. There is very little export demand for flour, and only 800 bbls. sold at \$11 @ 11 50 for extra, and \$12 @ 12 25 for extra family. Receipts small. Rye flour is scarce and firm at \$9. In corn meal nothing doing. The wheat market is inactive; red at \$2.60, white at \$2.70 @ 2.85. Rye commands \$1.75 @ 1.75. Corn is in no better demand, as to the market for old wheat, \$1.70 for new do, and \$1.85 for old white. Oats are in good request, and 5,000 bushels sold at 91 @ 92c. No change in barley or malt. Provisions and groceries are quiet. Petroleum moves slowly owing to the absence of supplies; sales of crude at 46 @ 47c, refined in bond at 78 @ 79c, and free at 85 @ 86c. Residium is held at \$9. Whisky sells slowly at \$1.91, and Ohio at \$1.92 @ 1.93.
