From the 201st Regiment. Camp Slough, West Alexandria, Va., December 21, 1864. EDITOR TELEGRAPH—Dear Sir:—This morning at 4 o'clock, a few minutes before we left our post of duty on Duke street, a drizzling rain commenced falling; and, had an hour later we were treated to a profusion of sleet and snow, which lasted till 12 m., covering the ground to the depth of an inch or more.

And so we gathered round our two stoves, (which stand so closely together as a pair of siamese-twins—for want of room, you know!) trying to keep comfortable, while the tiny drops of frozen rain, clear as crystal, fell over and around us in profusion. Notwithstanding friend Musser's effort to keep up steam in the old "tobacco-box" (the oblong-shaped, worn-out, sheet-iron affair which cost us 50 cents) and Sergeant Ditty's doing his best with "Humburg," extra ten-plate, (price 84,) we could not raise the spirit of either (that falls upon us at almost any other time, when not needed), to drive annihilation and despondency away!

Rev. James Collier and son, of Harrisburg, paid our camp a visit yesterday. The Rev. gentleman was joyfully received by the old members of his congregation, and by the rest of his numerous Harrisburg friends, who spent several hours in social converse with their old friend and pastor. Rev. Collier left in the 6 o'clock P. M. boat for Washington. We regret exceedingly that a visit to one of our friends outside of camp deprived us from shaking hands with the Rev. gentleman.

A number of active members of the "Hope Engine Company," now attached to the 201st regiment, are anxious to know whether the new steamer has yet made its appearance, and how the monster operates. A line from their old friend, the ex-Mayor and President of the company, would be cheerfully read, stating the affairs of their favorite Old Company. Will the respected chief officer of the "Hope" please inform the "Hivers" attached to the 201st of the operations of their old friend, now running the institution? The party sent from Camp Slough, two days ago, in charge of J. H. Snow, commanding, for the purpose of escorting a party of prisoners to Point, returned to camp this P. M., well pleased with the trip. Captain Fisher, Provost Judge, has disposed of the following cases for the last two days. It will be seen that the number of King Alog had been getting themselves into hot water, daily, notwithstanding the fate of some of their fellow citizens, arrested and punished for the same offence, but a few days since: Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. Maloney, two Irish women, charged with the smuggling of pizen, were ordered to be sent to the slave pen, 30 days each, and to be clapped out of the city, at the expiration of said time. Richard McSherry, charged with selling fire-water, was fined \$50. Bridget and Johanna Burke, two Irish women, for harboring deserters, were provided with the "comforts of a home," in the slave-pen, for one month each. Jas. Morrow, for selling corn-juice, was fined to the tune of \$100. Bridget Pedergast, for harboring citizen in Uncle Sam's outfit, and keeping a disorderly house, was furnished with a permit; to the slave pen for 10 days. Nothing new in camp. Boys all in good spirits. More anon. A. H. B.
