Fritz in a Straw.—Lager to the Rescue.—The peaceful ocean of mind that washes the southern boundary of our city, was violently agitated, on yesterday, by the denunciation of an affair of the heart, of the most intense and chivalrous character.

COLLEY CIBBER.—Colley Cibber, in spite of his occupancy of a niche in Pope's Dunciad, was one of the most popular play writers of his day.

His first play, "Love's Last Shift, or The Fool in Fashion," met with great success. Performing the part of Sir Novelty Fashion himself, Cibber was warmly applauded both as author and actor.

In 1730, Cibber retired upon his pension as Laureate; seldom thereafter appearing on the stage, except when his presence was necessary to strengthen the cast of some particular play.

He was a sufficiently liberal remuneration to prove that he was still a favorite with the habits of the play house. In 1746 he published his "Apology for his Life," by which he gained it, is said, £1,500.
