FIRE.—A small shed, or office, located in the lower end of Second street, near the canal bridge, took fire yesterday between 11 and 12 o'clock, and was partially consumed. All the fire companies promptly responded to the alarm.

FIREWORKS.—Professor Jackson, the well-known pyrotechnist, of Philadelphia, proposes making a display of fire-works to-morrow evening. He will arrive to-day and make the necessary arrangements, which will be announced to-morrow's paper.

MILITARY.—The Cameron Guards, Capt. Byater, will meet to-day at 12 o'clock, for the purpose of performing escort duty to visiting companies, two of which are expected to-day at 1 o'clock, and to this evening. The entire military escort to-morrow will be composed of about eight companies.

HOPPE BALL.—Don't forget that the great Hoppe Ball comes off at Drunt's Hall this evening. The hall has been gorgeously decorated, and every other arrangement made for visitors to put in a gay time. A few tickets yet remain unsold. Secure one at once—go in and be happy.

UNITED STATES TROOPS.—On Saturday morning two hundred and sixty soldiers, in the army service, together with several car loads of horses, arrived from Fort Leavenworth, on their way to Fort M'Henry. They were a fine body of men, and attracted a great many people to the railroad to see them.

ABUNDANCE OF PROVISIONS.—There was enough provisions in the market on Saturday morning to feed ten thousand men for a period of ten days, at least. Messrs. Neuser, Koser and Col. Metzger made a display of splendid beef, and, in fact, all the butchers had prepared themselves with extra supplies. Butter and eggs were plenty, at previous rates, but poultry was a little up in the figures.

NAME AWARDED.—The proposals of donations to the new steam fire engine were opened on Thursday, when it was found that Mrs. Marion Verbeke was the largest contributor to the fund. The steamer, as given or purchased, will be named after Mrs. Verbeke, or such any other name she may select, in accordance with a resolution of the company.

BEFORE THE MAYOR.—John Wilson, James Judge and Charles Price, traveling companions, bound for Carlisle, were arrested by the Chief of Friday, all of them laboring under the "influence." Their spiritual manifestations the Chief deemed insulting to the dignity of this great and growing city, and he put them in the lock-up, the place above all others that they wanted to be. Their "coppers" were exceedingly hot, and after making several vigorous attacks upon a pitcher of water in the office, they were ordered to vacate.

Alexander Stewart, a lodger for the third time last week came forth and appeared, but could give no other reason why he had not shook the snow of the city off his boots, than that his partner had got a job, and he was loath to leave him until it was finished.

SHOCKING IMMUNITY.—A revolting case of barbarity has been brought to light near Wilkes-Barre, Pa. An old man named Isaac Biebing, living in that vicinity, quarrelled with his son Andrew, and in a fit of rage he seized a gun and shot the boy in the back, from the efforts of which it is feared he cannot recover. It seems that the old man was a perfect demon, and some of his acts of barbarity towards his wife and children would have shamed the wildest savage. He would frequently hang the younger children up by the neck until life was almost extinct, and at other times he would hold their heads under the water until they struggled in the agonies of death. One of the boys fled to the house of a neighbor one day, badly hurt, and stated that his father had thrown a red hot poker into the bed in which the children slept, just to see the frolic they would have getting out! At another time he nearly drowned his wife by hold her head in a creek of butter-milk! It would be a just retribution if this man should come to the gallows; and he bids fair to end his career on the scaffold.

A CAVALRY SQUAD.—The people of Bethlehem, and a large number of them, were slightly sold, on Saturday last. For some days previous to that time large bands were posted up all over the town, and the surrounding neighborhood that Prof. Kaick, of Philadelphia, the great wire-walker, would walk on a single wire in the place, on Saturday afternoon, January 5th, at 3 o'clock. The wire was to be extended from the Union Hotel to the building opposite, a distance of 100 feet, and at an elevation of 50 feet, and the Professor was to take a child over the wire on a wheelbarrow. Long before the time announced people from the country as well as town folks were seen wending their way to the spot named, to see the great performance. Young America was largely represented, and in a short time the pavements were crowded with females and males, anxiously turning their eyes up to see the wire. The town clock struck the appointed hour, but neither Professor nor wire could be discovered, when the people soon began to smell a "rat," and it leaked out that Professor Kaick, leg, body and all, had left the hotel the evening previous, "borrowing" an overcoat and a pair of gloves, as well as pocketing some \$10 that had been collected for the performance that he was going to give. On leaving the hotel he stated that he was going to the depot to receive his wife, but never returned. It was calculated that there were several hundred people on the spot to see his performance, and it is a singular fact, that no one was heard to have been there. Those coming back all had "the same" in that part of the borough.

To put others on their guard against this imposture, we will state that he has on a dark overcoat and a pair of buckskin gloves. He is a middle-aged stout man, weight about 180 pounds; 5 feet in height, rosy-red appearance, and a German by birth. No doubt he will soon turn up somewhere else under another name.

FACTS ABOUT CELEBRATED MEN.—Some literary men make good men of business. According to Pope, the principal object of Shakespeare in cultivating literature was to secure an honest independence. He succeeded so well in the accomplishment of this purpose that, at a comparatively early age, he had realized a sufficient competency to enable him to retire to his native town of Stratford-upon-Avon. Chaucer was in early life a soldier, and afterwards a commissioner of customs and inspector of woods and crown lands. Spencer was secretary to the Lord Deputy of Ireland, and is said to have been abreast and sagacious in the management of affairs. Milton was secretary to the Council of State during the Commonwealth, and gave abundant evidence of his energy and usefulness in that office. Sir Isaac Newton was a most efficient Master of the Mint. Wordsworth was a distributor of stamps; and Sir Walter Scott a clerk to the Court of Session—both uniting a genius for poetry with practical and practical habits as men of business. Ricardo was no less distinguished as a sagacious banker than a lucid expounder of the principles of political economy. Grote, the most profound historian of Greece, is also a London banker. John Stuart Mill, not surpassed by any living thinker in profundity of speculation, lately retired from the examiner's department in the East India Company with the admiration of his colleagues for the rare ability with which he had conducted the business of the department. Alexander Murray, the distinguished linguist, learned to write by scribbling his letters on an old wood-card with the end of a burnt heather stem. Professor Moore, when a young man, being too poor to purchase Newton's "Principia," borrowed the book, and copied the whole of it with his own hand. William Cobbett made himself master of English grammar when he was a private soldier on the pay of sixpence a day. The edge of his berth, or that of his guard bed, his seat to study in; a bit of board lying on his lap was his writing table; and the evening light of the fire his substitute for candle or oil. Even advanced age, in many interesting cases, has not proved fatal to literary success. Sir Henry Spelman was between fifty and sixty when he began the study of science. Franklin was fifty before he fully engaged in the researches in natural philosophy which have made his name immortal. Boccaccio was thirty-five when he entered upon his literary career; and Alfieri was forty-six when he commenced the study of Greek. Dr. Arnold learned German at forty for the sake of reading Niebuhr in the original. James Watt, at about the same age, while working at his trade of an instrument maker in Glasgow, made himself acquainted with French, German and Italian, in order to pursue the valuable works in those languages on mechanical philosophy. Handel was forty-eight before he published any of his great works. Nor are the examples of rare occurrence in which apparently natural defects, in early life, have been overcome by a subsequent devotion to knowledge. Sir Isaac Newton, when at school, stood at the bottom of the lowermost form but one. Barrow, the great English divine and mathematician, when a boy at the Charter House School, was notorious for his idleness and indifference to study. Adam Clarke, in his boyhood, was proclaimed by his father to be a grievous dunce. Even Dean Swift made a disastrous failure at the University. Sheridan was presented by his mother to a tutor as an incorrigible dunce. Walter Scott was a dull boy at his lessons, and while a student at the Edinburgh University received his sentence from Professor Dalziel, the celebrated Greek scholar, that "dunce he was, and dunce he would remain." Chatterton was returned on his mother's hands as "a fool, of whom nothing could be made." Wellington never gave any indications of talent until he was brought into the field of practical effort, and was described by his strong-minded mother, who thought him little better than an idiot, as fit only to be "food for powder."

CAPTURE OF A HORSE THIEF.—Recovery of Stolen Property.—On Thursday night last, a bay mare was stolen from the stable of Jacob Hoke, in Susquehanna township, together with a saddle and a halter. On the same night, there was stolen from the premises of Mr. H. W. Hoffman, residing near Mr. Hoke, a sleigh, harness, two bridles and two blankets. Information of those robberies were brought to the city, and dispatches sent to the neighboring towns and villages. On Friday, the keeper of a toll-gate informed Jacob Grove, the constable of Elizabethtown, Lancaster county, that a man had passed through the gate, who had left a saddle in pledge for payment of toll. Mr. Grove immediately started in pursuit, and at one place ascertained that the man had offered to sell all the stolen property for fifty dollars. About two miles west of Columbia he overtook him, and brought him to this city late on Friday night, when Justice Beader committed him to jail for a further hearing. The man gave the name of Samuel Bingham, and says that he lives in Strasburg, Lancaster county, to which place he was going. He also says that he has lately been confined in the State Lunatic Asylum, from which place he escaped. He is either insane, or feigns insanity, and circumstances would seem to justify the belief that he is really insane, as no man in his right mind, unless he was excessively green, would perpetrate such a bold and open robbery in these telegraphic days, without a previous arrangement to secure the plunder. It will probably be ascertained to-day whether his story is correct or not.

"DA BUI TIME COMING."—The negroes in Washington (there are about 15,000 free negroes in the city) are very much excited, and some amusing stories are related of them. A lady who had hired a free negro girl from her mother, wished to engage her services for the next year, but was informed by the mother that Lincoln having been elected, her husband expected to get a clerkship, and then she would send her daughter to a northern boarding school for young ladies.

Apprehes of this, a friend who lately resided in Washington tells a good joke on the same subject. "Nebber mind," said Chlo, indignantly, "nebber mind—Mass. Lincon soon take his seat, don't you'll doin' my washin'!"

LEGAL TENDERS.—Notwithstanding the explicit laws on the subject of legal tender in payment of debts, cases frequently occur in which parties are permitted by magistrates to pay off debts in coin of low denomination, in order to annoy as much as possible a successful claimant. One of these cases has just been brought to our attention by an attentive correspondent in one of the country districts. He states that on the fifteenth of December, a suit was brought before a justice in his neighborhood to compel a settlement of accounts between two neighbors, whose names we withhold. Judgment was rendered in favor of plaintiff for five dollars and fifty cents, and on the fourth of January the defendant, who seems to have occupied the interim in securing the "material" brought the amount to the magistrate's office in cents—five hundred and fifty of them in two bags. The magistrate should have given him the privilege of "noting" his specie home again, as, by law, cents are not legal tender for sums above twenty-five cents. A story is told of a Yankee who had offered ninety-nine cents for postage stamps, and on being informed of the law in relation to legal tender proceeded to purchase his stamps one at a time and hand over three cents until the patience of the official gave out, and the balance of his cash was taken in one lump, in payments on judgments no such trickery could avail.
