FIRE .- The house of Michael O. Skelly, an old and respectable citizen of Summerhill township, Cambria county, was entirely consumed, together with its contents, on Thursday night last, by fire. Mr. Skelly was absent from home, and his family narrowly escaped destruction. His wife and children got out of the burning house in their night clothes, and were forced to walk half a mile to their nearest neighbor in their bare feet. They have the sympathy of the community in their loss.

THE STORM .- The storm of Thursday appears to have been pretty general all over the country. It has levelled the telegraphic wires in every direction, so that we are this morning again without our usual dispatches.

It is probable that the stormhas done an immense amount of damage, especially to vessels on the Atlantic Ocean. Beside the destruction of several spans of the Northern Central Railroad bridge at Dauphin, no material damage was done in this city. A few barns in the neighborhood were partially unroofed, and some signs and fences were levelled, but nobody was injured.

SEASON OF LENT .- The season of Lent will begin on Wednesday of next week, and continue for forty days, the obligation of its observance resting upon all of the Roman Catholic faith who have reached the age of twenty-one years, unless specially dispensed. Archbishop Kendrick has issued the regulations to be observed, which require that but one meal per day shall be taken, Sundays excepted, and that at or about noon. A collation will be permitted in the evening, to consist of bread, butter, choose, fruit, salad, vegetables and fish. The exemptions from these regulations are those under twenty-one years of age, the sick, nursing women, those who do hard labor, and those who through weakness cannot fast without prejudice to their health. The occasion is one of much solemnity in the Catholic Church.

"HE HAD NO TIME TO TARRY—HE HAD NO TIME TO STAY."-The Rev. Mr. Robinson has been heard from. He has arrived in Pittsburg, but at last accounts he had not secured an engagement. Unfortunately for him, we fear his fame will precede him wherever he may go.
