Addresses were delivered by two three white officers who are willing to go into field on an equality with their sable brethren. e learn that Harrisburg is to be one of the reniting stations, but as the negroes of this city we no stomach for the fight, the attempt to se recruits here will not be very successful. Coniption is the only mode by which our "Ameris of African descent" can be got into military rice, and as the bill recently passed does not apt this class, of course a large proportion of n will be drafted and put into the army side by with white citizens.

THE CASE OF KAPP .- The insane man, William Kapp, who has been confined in prison here since last Sunday night, will probably leave this morning for Baltimore, in charge of Wm. Bostick, Sr., who has consented to accompany him to that city and hand him ever to his relatives. We learned yesterday that the neice of Kapp, Miss Herbert, who came with him from Vincennes, Indiana, had a conversation with a lady at the depot, in which she stated that Kapp sold all his property at the west with a view of returning to his former home in Maryland, and that she had, a large amount of his money in her possession. Before their departure from Vincennes he exhibited unmistakeable symptoms of insanity, and on the way here she had great trouble with him on account of his repeated efforts to escape from the cars and remain behind. After reaching this city he accomplished his purpose. Instead of stopping here to look him up, the girl pursued her journey south, with his money and baggage, (the latter consisting of four large and well-filled trunks,) and for six days Kapp wandered about the city, day and night, taking neither food nor sleep. The girl stated that her uncle had relatives in Baltimore city, and that she resided at Woodbine station, on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, some distance from Baltimore. The mystery of this affair is that nothing has been heard from the girl since, and no effort has been made by his Baltimore relatives to ascertain his whereabouts. Miss Herbert knew that she left him in this city, in an insane condition, and must have communicated the fact to her father. We do not wish to be thought uncharitable, but the fact of her having possession of a large amount of Kapp's money may account for the mysterious silence of herself and family and their apparent indifference to the unfortunate man's fate. Mr. Bostick's investigation will probably throw some light upon the subject, and we anxiously await his return.

LIEUT. WH. R. ORTH .- This gallant young officer, whose death we appounced in a recent issue, was born in Lower Paxton township, Dauphin county. The Dauphin Journal says the deceased graduated at the Franklin and Marshal college in 1859. He possessed more than ordinary talents, being endowed with a strong mind and a firm will. always ready to conquer any difficulty as a student, and acquitted himself with credit in whatever position he was placed. When a call was made for more troops last summer, he was ready to answer it, and took, as it were, his life in his hand and unsheathed his sword for his country. He was one of the many heroes of the Fredericksburg battle. His scabbard was hit by a deadly missile and broken in two, as well as his sword, wounding one of his limbs severely. This he bore with great patience. He could have had his discharge at any time, but would not accept it, preferring to serve his country. On the 17th he was seized with congestive fever, which caused his death in a short time. His remains were brought home to Hummelstown, and were interred in the Hummelstown cemetery, along side of his father, who was a hero of 1812. The funeral was attended by a very large number of relatives and friends. Addresses were delivered by Revs. Gans, of Harrisburg, Huber and M. A. Smith, of Hummelstown. Few were present who did not feel that they had sustained great loss. He was beloved by all who knew him, and especially by his fellow patriots.

ADJOURNED .- The Lutheran Conference which met in Middletown last Monday was in session three days, adjourning on Wednesday evening. There was a large attendance. Reverends Charles A. Hay, E. S. Johnson and Samuel A. Holman represented this city. Much business pertaining. to the welfare of the church within the bounds of the conference was attended to. On Tuesday afternoon the members visited the Emans Orphan House, by special invitation, and were cordially welcomed by the Tutor in charge and his lady.— They spent an hour very pleasantly in the institution, and all rejoiced at the bright prospects be-

THE "IRREPRESSIBLE CONFLICT" between whites and blacks still goes on. Yesterday a stalwart "American of African descent," employed as porter at the White Hall hotel, was assaulted by a white man who struck him on the head with a solid "dornick," inflicting an ugly gash from which the blood flowed in such a profuse stream as to completely saturate his clothing. The assault was provoked by alleged insolence on the part of the negro, who "put on airs" and indulged in language that the white man wouldn't submit to. Scenes of this description, now of frequent occurrence, will become still more numerous in this and other northern cities.

ASSAULT ON A WOMAN .- A belligerent "American of African descent," named John Preston, was arrested by officer Campbell yesterday afternoon, charged with assaulting and beating Maria Murray, and threatening to "cut her heart out." For some time past John and Maria have been living together on very intimate terms, and John, mistrusting the fidelity of his sable paramour, yielded to the prompting of the "green eyed monster" and committed the offence for which she had him arrested. The Mayor committed him for trial.
