PAR. 11. The officers of the Ward nominating meetings shall furnish their respective Ward Executive Committees a certified copy of their proceedings, setting forth the number of votes cast for each candidate for City and Ward officers, which proceedings shall be returned by the Ward Executive Committee to the President of the City Executive Committee. PAR. 6. The Democratic City Executive, Com
