THE MAILS.—Under the change of schedule on the different railroads, the time of closing the mails at the Harrisburg Post Office, November 17, 1882, is as follows:

PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD.—For all places between Harrisburg and Philadelphia, at 6.30 a. m.

WEST.—For all places between Harrisburg and Altoona, at 12.40 p. m.

NORTH.—For all places between Harrisburg and Philadelphia, at 12.40 p. m.

EAST.—For all places between Harrisburg and Reading, Pottsville, Easton and Philadelphia, at 7.00 a. m.

SETTLED.—We learn that the difficulty with the miners at the Lykens Valley coal mines has been satisfactorily adjusted, and that they have resumed work.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT.—Mrs. Verbeke wished to acknowledge the receipt of a box containing hospital stores for the use of the sick and wounded soldiers, from the ladies of Smethport, McKean county; also a barrel for the same purpose from the ladies of Lafayette and Hamilton, McKean county.

COURT RELIEF FUND.—The commissioners have appointed Morris Johnson, of Middletown, their agent for the distribution of the county relief fund in that place and vicinity. He attends at the post office on Friday of each week for that purpose.

CRUSHED TO DEATH.—Recently a young man named Martin Linty was at work in a carpenter shop at a lock on the Pennsylvania canal between Williamsburg and Hollidaysburg, when the roof fell in and injured him to such an extent that he died in a few hours.

MEAT THEFTS.—A few nights ago the smoke house of Mr. David Rooks, in Swatara township, was invaded by thieves who stole hams, shoulders, flitches, sausages, and other kinds of meat to the value of seventy-five dollars.

PROMOTED.—Sergeant J. B. Nissley, of Middletown, has been promoted to a lieutenant in company H, 127th regiment Pennsylvania volunteers.

MARRIAGE NEWS.—We learn from the New York Herald that the United States Revenue Cutter Crawford, commanded by Captain John Carson, (a native of this city and son of Charles Carson, Esq.,) has for a year past been stationed as guard boat, at the Narrows, the most responsible position near New York, and has rendered important service by the prompt and energetic course of her officers.

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THE CITY ELECTION.—The "Oppenheider" Victorians—Mass Meeting of the Jubilant Democracy. The municipal election yesterday was one of the most fiercely contested, on the part of the Abolitionists, that has ever taken place in this city, and notwithstanding the strenuous efforts and corrupt means resorted to, the indomitable Democracy came out of the contest victorious, electing their candidates for Mayor, City Auditor, Common Council, and the whole ticket, except in the Fifth ward, by handsome majorities.
