MEAT THIEVES .- A few nights ago the smoke house of Mr. David Rooks, in Swatara township, was invaded by thieves who stold hams, shoulders, flitches, sausages, and other kinds of meat to the value of seventy-five dollars. Suspicion attaches to certain parties in this city, but no arrests have yet been made.

PROMOTED.-Sergeant J. B. Nissley, of Middletown, has been promoted to a lieutenantcy in compapy H, 127th regiment Pennsylvania volunteers. He originated and was mainly instrumental in getting up the company, which saved Middletown from a draft, and should long since have filled the post to which he was recently promoted. The licutenant has the right kind of "pluck" and will distinguish himself in his new position.

MARINE NEWS .--- We learn from the New York Herald that the United States Revenue Cutter Crawford, commanded by Captain John Carson (a native of this city and son of Charles Carson, Esq.,) has for a year past been stationed as guard the Narrows the most responsible position near New York, and has rendered important service by the prompt and energetic course of her officers. No vessel has been permitted to leave the harbor for sea by the way of the Narrows, withou being overhauled. Over five thousand vessels, for foreign and Southern ports, have been boarded by the officers of the Crawford, and their clearances carefully scrutinized. The following is a list of her officers: John Carson, Captain : John A. Underwood, First Lieutenant ; George W. King, Second Lieutenant; Charles F. Shoemaker, Third Lieutenant; Antone Anderson, Boatswain; Wm West, Gunner; George Payne, Carpenter. evening announced that Captain Asbury Awl was under arrest for absenting himself from this city without leave, and demanded his instant dismissal in disgrace from the service. The same paper of last evening contained a communication from Captain Dodge stating that Captain Awl was not under arrest, and had given no excuse for such a proceeding. The Captain returned to this city yesterday and demanded a retraction of the false statement put forth by the nigger organ, and it was obliged to come down. Having made a public recantation of one falsehood, the Telegraph, unable to restrain its propensity for misrepresentation. gives utterance to another, by asserting that it has Captain Awl's own verbal declaration that he is no Democrat. If the gallant Captain is the man we take him to be the nigger organ will have to retract this falsehood as promptly and emphatically as it did the first. ALTERED GREENBACKS .- The counterfeiters are beginning to extensively alter two dollar greenbacks to fifties. When compared with a genuine fifty dollar note, the cheat is quite apparent. In the centre of each of the genuine bills--i e. the twos and fifties-there is a fine steel engraving, alike in all respects. This fact has doubtless suggested the idea of altering the twos. In the genuine fifties, however, the head is immediately between the word "United" and the word "States," whereas in the "twos" the words are above the engraving. In addition to this, the fifty dollar notes are covered over on the back with the number "50," which is not the case in the altered notes. Four or five cases of this nature have recently come to the notice of officers. With one exception, however, the rogues have escaped detection. No person would be likely to be deceived by them a second time; but those who deal in "fifties" would do well to examine them carefully when offered by strangers. SCARCITY OF CENTS .- Surprise is everywhere expressed at the scarcity of cents, and no one is able to give a satisfactory reason for it. A few months ago they were almost the only currency, and both sollers and boyers objected to receiving them. Many of our citizens were obliged to take them to market in rolls of twenty-five cents each, to an extent that made them a positive nuisance to carry. Cents were given in exchange for dol. lar bills when but a small amount was to be taken out, and no one could avoid carrying more or less of them. Now it is difficult to get them, so much so that many housekeepers are unable to buy anything of a less value than five cents. Those most affected by the scarcity of cents are least able to bear it. Apple and cake vendere, newsboys and the keepers of small shops, all find it difficult to make change, and many of them cannot, at times, sell for that reason. The scarcity of cents is the more remarkable from the fact that they are being made at the mint to the same extent that they were before the suspension of specie payments, and are put in circulation as fast as made. THE CITY ELECTION .- The "Copperheads" Victorious—Mass Meeting of the Jubilant Democracy. The municipal election yesterday was one of the most fiercely contested, on the part of the Abolitionists, that has ever taken place in this city, and notwithstanding the strenuous efforts and corrupt means resorted to, the indomitable Democracy came out of the contest victorious, electing their candidates for Mayor, City Auditor, Common Council, and the whole ticket, except in the Fifth ward, by handsome majorities. When the result was announced the jubilant Democracy assembled in front of the PATRIOT AND UNION office and gave vent to their enthusiasm in repeated cheers for

Boumfort and the Constitution. sand Dollars Stolen .--- In our last issue we intimated that the money safe of the Adams Express Company was recently stolen from a railroad train. The robbery occurred last Wednesday night on the Northern Central railway between Baltimore and Harrisburg. The baggage master, with the messenger of the Express Company, Mr. Jos. Weitzel, of this city, were both in the car, and everything was all right when they reached Cockeysville. After leaving the last named place, both of the parties mentioned walked into the mail room, where they remained for a short time, and on nearing Parkton, a distance of only nine miles from Cockeysville, Mr. Weitzel returned to the baggage department and discovered that the safe was gone. At what point it was thrown from the car could not be ascertained. The safe contained about fifty thousand dollars in cash, a small portion of which was in gold. There was a large amount of certificates of indebtedness, but they are of no use to the thieves, as payment was at once stopped. There were also some government bonds, but they, too, are valueless. The principal part of the money had been sent from Washington, and was in transitu for the families of soldiers who are now with the army. The company has determined to make a rigid investigation of the matter, and to trace, if possible, the perpetrator of the daring robbery. The safe which contained the money and papers weighed some four or five hundred pounds, and it is supposed that more than one person was engaged

POLICE COURT .-- In the police court yesterday morning some further developments were made in the case of Charles Williams, the suspected pickpocket, and he was re-committed for another hearing. When first arraigned he represented himself as the keeper of a dry goods store in Boston, trav. eling on business, but could give no references or exhibit no papers to confirm his statement. Yesterday morning he informed the Mayor that he was a machinist and had worked at the business for two years past. At the time of his arrest he told officer Decters that he had just arrived on the western train, whereas he had been seen loafing about the depot during the entire night, in company with two other suspicious looking strangers. The fellow is evidently a "knuck" but the evidence of his guilt may not be sufficiently positive to warrant the Mayor in holding him for trial.

But his dreams, whether pleasant or otherwise, were soon disturbed by officer Deeters, who roused him from his drunken slumber and marched him off to the caluboose.
