HOMBLE.—A few days ago a little girl named Mary Reed, of West Lebanon, Indiana county, entered a steam grist mill, and by some means her clothing was caught by an upright shaft attached to the belting apparatus, forcing the body between the shaft and a post about six inches from it.

THE PASSOVER.—The feast of the Jewish Passover, which commenced last Friday, will close this evening at sundown. It has been strictly observed in this city.

THE CASE OF WILLIAM STROH.—We have learned some further particulars relative to the case of the insane man from Lebanon county, arrested here a few days ago and sent to the poor house. He was formerly a farmer in Lebanon county, and after acquiring considerable wealth retired from agricultural pursuits. For some years past he has been engaged in litigation with a number of persons, the perplexity and annoyance incident to which, in connection with pecuniary losses, finally affected his mind, and on numerous occasions he has wandered away from home, remaining absent for weeks at a time.

Passed THROUGH.—Lieut. Mark Supple, of the Fifty-first regiment Penn'a. volunteers, passed through this city yesterday en route for the seat of war, having been at his home in Upper Merion township, Montgomery county, for some time past, in a disabled condition, from the effects of a severe wound received at the battle of Fredericksburg.

POLICE AFFAIRS.—Nothing of special public interest has transpired in the police department for a week past. The quiet and good order which now prevails throughout our entire city limits is highly creditable to the new municipal Chief Magistrate and his active and efficient subordinates.

A FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—On Thursday morning a fatal accident occurred on the Pennsylvania railroad a few miles below Mount Joy. As the train going east was passing there a farmer named Henry G. Herr, living in that vicinity, undertook to drive some hogs off the track, when the bumper of the engine struck him, causing instant death.
