After the first of July the law goes into effect, and all drop or local letters carried by the city carrier will be delivered free of charge beyond the legal pre-paid rates, namely, two cents the half ounce or fraction thereof, on "drop" letters, and three cents per half cunce or fraction, on those passing through the mails.
