One of them, under Captain Bomgardner, was out yesterday morning armed and ready for service. They are a fine looking body of men, well calculated to keep the machinery of the old Keystone Commonwealth in good running order. The other company, which is to be commanded by Captain Buzzard, is fully organized, ready for "business," and is not a whit behind its brother company in men and muscle. The action of the railroad company, in suspending their important operations in the machine shops, is patriotic and commendable, and savors of the right spirit. WRO PAYS ?- A day or two since the rotund constable of the Second ward arrested a delegate to the Democratic Convention for publicly declaring that Vallandigham will be elected Governor of Obio ! ABOUT BATHING .- It is barely possible that some of our readers don't bathe often enough. Some haven't time, others are careless, and there are some who even take a slovenly pride in going through life unwashed, unconquerable. We have heard of one belonging to this last class who sandpapers his body every Christmas and thinks he is doing about the fair thing. The hide of such unregenerate Gentiles is proof against the arrows of persuasion or conviction; but to all others we would commend the virtues of the bath. To one feeling listless or uncomfortable, a bath is exhilirating, tonic, invigorating. Writers upon the subject say that, of the different varieties of bathing, the sponge-bath is the least froublesome, occupying less time than any other. The apparatus is simple, vis : a basin of water, a sponge, a towel and a mat. or bit of carpet, to stand upon. With the sponge, the body and limbs are moistened with water, and then rubbed dry with a towel. The water may be tepid or cold, according to the preference of the bather. In cold weather, when it is an object to excite a free reaction upon the skin, a hair mitten or hair brush may be used after the towel. The plunge-bath and the shower-bath may be warm or cold. Bathing should not be resorted to while the stomach is occupied in the process of most instantly relieve digestion. 
