Couch, and ordered to report to Major General Schenck, at Baltimore, which city seems also in imminent danger of attack. The Seventh is accompanied by a band of thirty-six instruments and a howitzer battery.

PROCLAMATION ST. THE MAYOR .- Mayor Roumfort has issued his proclamatiom requiring all persons selling liquors at retail to close their places of business from five o'clock p. m, to five a. m. This measure is dictated by wisdom and prudence, and its effects will doubtless be salutary under existing circumstances. We have no doubt that the municipal requirement will be cheerfully obeyed by those interested.

POLICE REPORTS .- Owing to the excitement of the past few days, and the press of other important matter, we have been compelled to forego our regular police report, but hope to resume it soon. A large number of arrests have been made and the cases disposed of, principally before Alderman Kline. The chief of police and his assistants are untiring in their efforts to preserve the peace and safety of the city.

A COMPARY OF POLICEMEN.—A fine company volunteers, belonging to the police force of Philadelphia, arrived here yesterday, and are now quartered on the Capitol grounds. They belong to the organization known as the "Philadelphia Home Guards," and number over ninety men. Few neater looking or better proportioned soldiers have visited the State Capital. They have adopted the heavy infantry tactics. Let the rebs take to the bushes if they don't want to be "spotted."

WE WOULD NOT deceive our readers in regard to the real condition of affairs. We warn them that this city is in greater peril than ever before. The sky is full of portents. The action of military men now here shows that we underrate the dangers that beset us.

There are many suggestive things which we cannot new divulge, but we call upon all true men to arouse now in defense of the State, for her Capital may even now stand on the brink of a great disaster.

TROOPS IN CAMP CURTIN .- There are now about five thousand troops in Camp Curtingand the number is constantly and rapidly increasing. Besides these, large numbers of the militia stay in the Capitol grounds and other places, finding their own sleeping accommodations. We noticed the steps and vestibule of the Capitol building and the department buildings filled with militiamen last night, who were apparently resting as soundly as they ever did on downy beds in the "piping times of peace."

RALLY, OLD Man.-All persons over forty years of age not attached to other military organizations, able to do military duty and willing to defend their homes and families in the entrenchments on the Cumberland side of the Susquehanna, will meet in front of the Morgan House, corner of Pine and Second streets, at ten o'clock a. m. on the 19th inst., to organize and appoint their officere, and be ready to march at a moment's warning. HELP FROM SISTER STATES .- The 176th New York, the 8th New York, and the 231 New Jersey came in on the eastern trains yesterday afternoon. The last named regiment was lying in camp in New Jersey, waiting to be mustered out, their nine months' calistment having expired. Upon hearing of our danger, they promptly and generously volunteered their services. The action of these sister States forms another link in the chain of affection that binds the old Keystone Common-

Since the above was in type two additional rements-one from New York and one from New Jersey-have arrived.

Communication with Castiste. We noticed the train for Carlisle going out as usual yesterday morning. Among those returning was a large number of negroes, who had fled down the valley a day or two before, lest they might fall into the "hands of the Philistines." They probably return upon the strength of the intelligence that the rebels have halted at Chambersburg, and are fortifying their position there. The condition of these black refugees is pitiful. If they stay at home, they are in danger of capture; if they go away, they find an unfriendly world with which to deal, and have to face hunger and misfortune without money or influence on their side. Even their professed friends ideal treacherously with them, and ignore their chains for help and sympathy.— It would be better for the contraband to stay where he is at all hazards, rather than run the gauntlet of the prejudice, the downright hatred, and the hypocritical, profitless friendship which he finds at his every step northward.

PARTICULARS ABOUT THE LATE FIGHT AT MARfineburg and the Wagor Train now Here.—We yesterday learned some important particulars concerning the fight at Mactinsburg on Sunday, and the retreat of the wagon train now encamped here. Our informant is Capt. F. A. Maulsby, of Western Virginia, who commanded an independent battery in that fight, was wounded in the leg, escaped to

Walnut street. From his statement it would appear that we have been in error in stating that the train spoken of belongs to General Milroy. It consists of the that has for years possessed and held him in thrall. wagons of Capt. E. P. Fitch, A. Q. M., Capt. Wm. Bosbyshell, A. Q. M., and Lieut. J. Lamb, A. A. Q. M., Third brigade, First division, and of the regimental teams of the 106th New York and the 126th Ohio. This train was lying on the road to Williamsport, four miles from Martinsburg, at the time of the engagement there on Sunday, and was started immediately, arriving here on Tuesday. They did not lose any wagons or stores except from breaking down on the road. All the government stores were moved away from Martinsburg.

This Third Brigade, First Division, was under command of Colonel F. B. Smith, 126th Ohio, and was attacked by a large robel force, which had passed around Milroy at Winchester, and came in on them while lying at Martinsburg. Skirmishing commenced there at 8 o'clock on Sunday morning, 14th inst., and was kept up briskly until 1 p. m., when it ceased entirely. About 2 30 p. m. it commenced again, and grew hotter until six o'clock, when the rebels opened with artillery from four different points. Captain Maulsby replied as vigorously as he could with his battery, maintaining the unequal contest in the streets of the town, una til he received orders from General Tyler (who was on the ground, but not commanding) to get away as soon as he could, as his infantry and cavalry supports had already gone.

Captain Maulsby then retreated through the own, the houses and streets of which were filled with rebel riflemen, and took the road leading to Williamsport. The rebel cavalry followed and captured his battery about three miles cut that road. The Captain escaped to Hagerstown, his horse being shot through the neck and himself badly wounded in the leg, the ball passing through below the knee. From Hagerstown he took the cars to this point, and, together with twenty-four of his men, arrived here on Monday. Two of his officers now have charge of guns on the fortificetions across the river.

Captain Maulsby states that the forces engaged on our side in the above fight were the 106th New York infantry, Col. James; the 126:h Ohio infantry, Lieut. Col. W. H. Harlan; independent Virginia battery, Captain Maulsby, and about forty men belonging to the 1st New York and the 12th and 18th Pennsylvania cavalry. It is probable that, had his battery been properly supported in the fight, the result might have been different. notwithstanding the large force of the enemy.

CHANGED QUARTERS .- Milroy's wagon train, which has been encamped for a day or two on the flats the other side the canal, was moved yesterday into a new camp about three miles out on the Jonestown read, where it will remain until further orders. During their stay bere, the jaded horses, which had been on the go for one hundred and twenty miles without an hour's rest, got some little chance to recuperate. The dusty drivers and the contrabands also enjoyed and improved their brief respite from the toils of the march. It was a diverting sight to see them performing antics in the meadows and diving into the waters of the brook. There is something remarkably fresh and volatile in the temperament of the African. Here penniless, outcast, in a strange land; yet, despite these depressing circumstances, their natural gaiety and good humor would assert itself in a hundred different ways, rising superior to the cankering care that would prey upon the heart of the "pale-faces" under like surroundings. It is one of the merciful arrangements of an all-wise Providence, which adapts the creature to the necessisties of its fate, and "tempers the wind to the shorn lamb."
