IMPORTANT TO BANKING AND SA-VING INSTITUTIONS.

The following letter, from Hon. J. J. Lewis. Commissioner of Internal Revenue, to a gentleman of New York City, is of importance to banking and savings institutions and their de-

Treasury Department, Office of Internal Reve-mue, Washington, Sept. 28, 1863.—Sin:—Sec-tion seven of the act to provide ways and means, &c., approved March 3d, 1863, relates to the taxation both of notes issued as currency and of deposits of money subject to payment on checks or draft.

You inquire whether any parties are taxable upon their deposits unless they have notes in circulation which are likewise taxa-

That part of the section in question which has reference to circulation reads as follows: "That all banks, associations, corporations or individuals issuing notes or bills for circulation as currency, shall be," &c., &c., while that which imposes a tax on deposits is in these words: "And all banks, associations, corporations and individuals receiving deposits of money, subject to payment on checks or drafts. except savings institutions, shall be subject to a duty of one-eighth per centum each half year from and after April 1st, 1863, upon the average amount of such deposits beyond the average amount of their circulating notes or bills lawfully issued and outstanding as currency."

The limitation of this tax to the average amount of deposits above the average circulation, whose tax was already provided in the same section, relieves from taxation those associations and individuals who have deposits, but who have no currency in circulation.

The statute expressly exempts savings institutions and no others. Now, if it was intended to assess a tax upon deposits only when there is no circulation, savings banks would have needed no special exemption, for their want of circulation would have relieved such a tax. It would appear that savings banks are in a class by themselves, and that in determining the tax upon the deposits of the other class, the circulation is important only as it reduces the

amount to be taxed. If there is no circulation, then nothing is to be deducted from the average deposits, which are to be taxed.

This seems to be the spirit of the statute, and I find nothing in the language which forbeils this construction. Very respectfully years, &c., J. J. Lewis, Commissioner Internal Revenue.
