HEAVY SALES .- The sales of the 5-20 years' 6 per cent loan, by the government agents throughout the country, on Friday amounted to the enormous aggregate of \$2,617,600. This is the largest amount sold in any one day for several months.

CHURCH OF GOD .- The East Pennsylvania Eldership of the Church of God meets at Middletown to-morrow night. Rev. E. H. Thomas, of Lancaster, will preach the opening sermon, and preaching will be continued every evening during the session.

ANTHRACITE COAL TRADE.—This great trade is still active from all sources of production. The demand for domestic purposes is brisk, and prices are steady for cargoes, as well as for coal at the yards. An abstract from the reports of the various mining companies, for the week ending Saturday, shows that the tonnage for the week was 230,528 tons, which was about the same as the week previous. The aggregate for the current year is 7,742,963 tons, being an increase over the tonnage to corresponding time last year of 1,478,-196 tons. Coal being worth at least two dollars per ton more at the mines than last year, the increase on the entire production is equal to nearly \$15.500.000! If to this is added the last year's cost of coal, transportation, etc., we shall find the net proceeds of our mines settling at some point between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000.

Honse and Thier Identified .- Mr. Stansbury, the stealing of whose horse from his farm in Baltimore county, Md., we noticed in Friday's paper, together with the arrest of the supposed thief and recovery of the horse by officer Campbell, arrived in this city on Saturday. He identified the horse, which had been taken to Toner's stable, and on being confronted with the prisoner, James Jones, he recognized him as having sat near him in church, in Baltimore county, on the night the horse was taken. Jones did not deny the statement, and this, together with the confused and contradictory nature of the young man's own story, induced the Alderman to remand him to prison. The horse was accordingly given up to the owner, and the defendant is in prison awaiting a requisition from the Governor of Maryland.

The reward offered by Stansbury, we understand was \$75-that is, \$25 for the recovery of the horse, and \$50 for the apprehension of the thief. This was justly due to efficer Campbell; but, by some manipulations which certain professional gentlemen understand better than he does, he did not receive a cent of it. The horse was taken away, and the man who recovered him goes unrewarded. Officer Campbell informs us that the reward was withheld by advice of the District Attorney, who told him that a police officer was not entitled to a claim for reward in cases of this nature. ELECTION FRAUDS.—We begin to discover the secret of some of the unprecedented Abolition majorities at the late election. The case of the First Ward in the city of Pittsburg, where the vote for Curtin was largely in excess of all former years, proves conclusively that the ballot boxes have been tampered with. A meeting of the Democratic voters of that ward was held early last week, at which a list was taken of those residents who testified, under oath, that they voted for Woodward for Governor on the second Tuesday of October. The result of this count proved that 150 men voted for Woodward in that ward, whereas but 78 votes were returned for him by the election officers! An adjourned meeting was held by the Democracy of the same ward on Saturday evening, at which seven additional persons came forward and took a solemn oath that they voted for Woodward. This number, added to the list previously taken, swells the aggregate to 157—or 79 more men who swear they voted for Woodward in that ward than the election officers returned for that gentleman! The chairman of the meeting pledged that the list would be increased to at least 160.

A committee was appointed whose duty it should be to investigate the election returns from every election district, and report every case of fraud that fell under their observation.

To Cure Dyspersia .- Hundreds -- nay, thousands-are afflicted with this distressing malady, and would gladly avail themselves of any means of relief. The following is highly recommended as an infallible cure : Take a new axe, weighing about four pounds, and put a white bickory handle in it; bore a hole in the top of the handle, fill the hole with gum camphor, and seal it up. Then take the axe and cut vigorously at a pile of cord wood, until the heat of the hand dissolves the gum camphor deposited in the end of the handle.

Monster Bank .- A public meeting of bankers evening, at which it was resolved expedient to organize a National Bank in that city, with a capital of five mittions, with the privilege of extending it to \$50,000,000, by such additions, from time to time, as may be deemed expedient. The necessary steps were taken to commence the procurement of subscriptions to the stock.

ADVANCE IN PRICE.-The journeymen cabinet makers of Lancaster have adopted a new scale of prices of the different kinds of work they are employed upon, which is some advance upon the old scale. The employers, knowing that the high price of living compelled the journeymen to demand the increase, agreed to the advance, and no "strike" was necessary.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT .- It is calculated that the total expenditures of the United States Quartermaster's Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1864, will amount to somewhere in the neighborhood of \$375,000,000 or \$400,000,000. Of this amount the Clothing Bureau alone will swallow upwards of \$100,000,000.

NATIONAL BANKS .-- Up to October 14th, 1863, one hundred and five National Banks have been established in the Northern States, under the new banking act. The official reports of these banks show an aggregate capital of \$12,776,000. The capital of the Pennsylvania banks amounts to \$1,271,500.
