The Cholera in St. Louis.

November 15, 1849. The Cholera has again made its appear-ance in St Louis. The Steamer Constitution, loaded with emigrants, arrived this morning from New Orleans. Thirty cases voyage; seventeen had terminated fatally. The epidemic had broken out above Vicksburg: The James Hewitt, from New Oric2ns,

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
