The decisive attitude assumed by England on the Turkish question has annoyed the Emperor very much. He has caused Count Nessultode to address an energetic note to the English Government on the subject. In this note the Emperor protests against this hostile demonstration in the widst of peace. tales to helself to interfere in a matter which regards only Russin and the cublime Porice. As to the difficulties which this affair may give rise to, the interpretation of the treaty between these two powers belongs (says the note) to them alone, and England ought to remain completely unconcerned with it. He was a handsome young man of 25 years of age I was informed that he awaited his death with the forti-

The second victim was M. Abancourt, who, after the Polish movement, had been condemned to twenty years imprisonment, and who joined the Hungarian insurrection, acting as adjutant to Dembinski. He was more collected than the Prince, and, indeed, he was able to address a few words to the public. The third and last sufferer was Giroa: he leaves three children behind him. He commanded the German Legion, assisted at the storming of Buda, and so great were his military, talents and zeal, that he was said to be appointed to the command of the garrison of Comorn. He was captured at Peterwardein. The dreadful scene closed with a prayer, in which the soldiers and the public joined."

On the 24th October, three more victims

died by the rope. The first that mounted the scaffold was Baron Sigmund V. Perenyi, seventy-five years of age. ex-President of the Board of Magnates of Hungary. It was his name that figured on the celebrated "Manifest of the Hungarian Nation to the high Constituent Diet," dated 10th Oct. 1848. The old

Swedish Intoxication Laws.

The laws against intoxication, are enforced with great rigor in Sweden. Whoever is seen drunk is fined for the first offence three dollars; for the second, six, for the third and fourth a still further sum, and is also deprived of the right of voting at elections and of being appointed a representaive. He is, besides, publicly exposed in the parish church on the following sunday. If the same individual is found committing

the same offence a fifth time, he is shut up in the house of correction, and condemned to six months hard labor; if he is again guilty, to twelve months punishment of a similar description, If the offence has been committed in public, such as at a fair, an auction, &c. the fine is doubled; and if the offender has made his appearance at a church the punishment is still more severe. Whoever is convicted of having induced anothand ogninst the right, which England arro- er to intoxicate himself is fined three dollars, which sum is doubled if the person is a minor. An ecclesiastic who falls into this offence loses his benefice; if he is a layman who occupies any considerable post, his functions are suspended, and perhaps he is dismissed. Drunkenness is never admitted as an excuse for any crime; and whoever dies when drank is buried ignominiously, and deprived of the prayers of the Church to which he belonged. It is forbidden to give, and more implicitly to sell, any spirituous liquors to students, workmen, servants, apprentices of private soldiers. . Whaever is observed drunk in the streets, or making a noise in a tavern, is sure to be taken to prison and detained until sober. without however, being on that account exempted from the fines. One-half of these fines go to the informers (who are generally policeofficers,) the other half to the poor. If the delinquent hes no money, he is kept in prison until some one pays for him, or until he has worked out his enlargement.
