

Southern Convictions.

An "occasional correspondent" of the Charleston Mercury, from Washington, in a recent letter, indiscriminately denouncing every man now figuring in the political world, except Mr. Calhoun, utters the following truth, which will be acceptable to more Southern ears than the correspondent imagined:

"No more slave States will ever be admitted. By some device or other, no more territory will ever be occupied by slaves. Cass, Webster, Clay, Benton, &c., all look to attain these results; but each goes about it in a way peculiar to himself, and to effect his own elevation to the Presidency."

This correspondent, too, expresses his fear, that the Nashville Convention will be perverted from its original purposes into a "nominating caucus for the next Presidency," and adds, "but for the very reasons, facts and designs I have given, it should take but the sterner and the higher course. It should insist on additional constitutional guarantees, or a separation. The first will never be given; and it must proceed at once, to the work of self-preservation. What stronger evidence could be adduced of the treasonable designs of this much-talked-of, but certain to be abortive."

From the Rio Grande.

The N. O. Picayune of the 9th has the following important news from the Rio Grande—briefly alluded to in our Telegraphic Dispatch yesterday morning.

By the arrival here yesterday of the steamship Globe, Capt. Boehmer, from Brazos the 5th inst., we have received the Brownsville flag and the Sentinel to the 27th ult. inclusive. The Sentinel says that the notorious Dr. Kellogg, who some months since commanded a party of robbers on the road between this place and Point Isabel, was lately arrested at Brazos by Mr. Stevens, Sheriff of the county. He was called on for bail in \$5,000, and in default was committed.

Public meetings have lately been held at Roma, Starr Co. and at Rio Grande City, on the terrible question, in which resolutions in favor of a separate Government were passed by overwhelming majorities.

The flag of the 27th ult. says it is reported that the attempted revolution at Victoria had terminated in a species of treaty between Gov. Cardenas and Gen. Vidal Fernandez, but that the partisans of the latter would not respect its provisions. Among those implicated in the affair of Victoria have taken flight. Four or five persons have been arrested, and Gen. Canales is said to be exercising the authority of the Executive, Cardenas being seriously ill.

The Crescent of the same date contains the following additional particulars:

The Rio Grande Sentinel contains a full account of the murder of three American traders, citizens of Rio Grande City—Messrs. Bowen, Camp and Smith—by Mexican troops on the 20th January, on the road leading to Monterey.

One of the resolutions adopted at the Roma Territorial meeting, before alluded to, was as follows:

Resolved—That it is the intent and the right of the people in the Territory between the Nueces and the Rio Grande and below the line of New-Mexico, to be organized as a Territory of the United States, separate and apart from the State of Texas, and that the Government of the United States be called on to extend over us, as soon as possible a Territorial Government.

It is proposed to hold a Convention at Brownsville, on the 15th inst. to adopt measures upon the subject.

The Sentinel announces that the first Protestant Church on the Rio Grande was organized at Brownsville on the 23d ult. under the pastoral care of Rev. Hiram Chamberlain, who was sent there by the Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church. The names of nineteen members were announced.

The Union in Texas.—In Harris county, Texas, at the recent election, 309 votes were given in reference to the Nashville convention. The persons suggested as delegates to the convention received four votes, and six others were in favor of the convention, but named no delegates. The other 295 votes were—No convention! No disunion! The Galveston Journal of the 8th instant says that the people of that place would not vote upon the question at all. We have little doubt that the whole state of Texas will give an emphatic "no" to the whole question.
