NATIONAL HOTEL, Washington, March 11, 1850.

SIR-I some time since addressed you a communication, upon which you informed me that it was your intention to take official action. Why have you not done it ? It is due to your reputation as well as mine that some positive action should be immediately taken. I hope and pray it may be personal. but from a thorough knowledge of your charneter, I presume it will be official. Every ina Ohl, aged 24 years. one knows that you have never yet been accused of a noble or generous act, and no one knows it better than myself. Why did you come home and undermine the veteran Connor, and why have you not done justice to the noble and daring Tatnall ? These ure questions which I suppose you will not answer; but, sir, I will answer them for without any nobility of character, you detertimed to violate every rule of honor for the elevation of yourself and family.

In my youth, when a young and innocent boy, before the down was upon my cheek, or a malicious feeling had entered my bosom, did you, attempt to crush me to public patronage. the carth by the strong arm of power. 
