### Revenue Board.

The following table comprises the valuation of taxable property for each county with a comparison with the valuation fixed in 1848. The increase is very considerable, in every, county and the revenue will be greatly enlarged for the next three years over the last three. The whole increase of taxable property in the last three years is **\$2**9,858,371.

The total addition to the valuation as returned to the board is \$6,883,153, which will increase the revenue over \$20,000 annually; while the whole expense of the board is trifling. The increase in the whole of taxable property for the last three years previous to 1848, which is attributed by the board to the depressed condition of the iron business and its influence upon the value of
