

His claims have frequently been asserted in the newspapers, but heretofore in so vague a way that few individuals of sense have paid much regard to them. The February number of Putnam's Magazine, however, contains an elaborate article upon the sub-ject, from which it would appear that the

case really presents some curious features, proving the whole affair to be either one of the most remarkable impostures in history, or one of the most amazing instances on record of "romance in real life."

This alleged heir to the Bourbons is now a venerable clergyman verging upon sevenly years of age, with an irreproachable character, who has been long a missionary among the Indians. He bears the name of the ses for a half-breed, having a reputed Indian mother living. But strange to say though the baptism of all his pretended brothers and sisters are duly recorded in the Boman Catholic register of their native, parish, of his alleged parents, it seems, were members of that denomination, yet of his own birth no such notice is taken.
