**In the Court of Common Pleas of Lehigh County.**

February 12, 1853, the court adopted the following rules to be observed hereafter:

Hereafter the terms of the several courts of Lehigh county, shall continue two weeks at the December and February terms; and if necessary, two weeks at May and September terms, and the business therein shall be regulated as follows, to-wit:

First.—The first week shall be devoted to the business of the Grand Jury, and the trial of criminal cases; the disposal of cases on the argument list, of the Common Pleas, Orphans Court, and Quarter Sessions, and the regular Orphans Court business of the County. That the regular Orphans Court day shall be Tuesday of the first of the term, on which day the acknowledgment of Sheriff's Deeds shall also be taken.

Second.—The second week of the term, shall be devoted to the trial of cases on the civil list, and to the hearing of such motions for rules, etc., as are usually granted without argument, but no regular argument shall be heard during said week, so long as the Jury are in attendance.
