Nankin.—A writer in Blackwood's Magazine in the course of an article on the insurrection in China, gives this sketch of Nankin:

It is situated in an immense plain, (formed by canals. Its fertile district is a network of rivulets and navigable water-courses, fringed with willows and bamboo. The King-Nan, or province of Nankin, is the richest gem in the diadem of the Son of Heaven. An Ordinance
Concerning Nuisance.

Be it ordained and enacted by the authority of the Corporation of the Borough of Catsaunqua, in Town Council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same.

SECT. 1. If any person or persons shall erect or place any stall, booths, boxes, wagons, or fix any convenience as a public stand and shall use the same for opening and selling oysters, or for the purpose of huckstering or offering for sale cakes and beer, or strong drinks, cordials, or cider, on any public day on any of the footways, or in any of the public streets of the Borough, every person so offending shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for every such offence to be recovered with costs of suit for the use of the Borough.

SECT. 2. If any person after the publication of this ordinance shall throw or leave any chips, ashes, shells, or dirt of any kind upon any of the footways, streets or alleys of this Borough, or shall after the passing of this ordinance, by writing with chalk, or any other way, deface any of the houses or fences within this Borough, he, she, or they, so offending shall forfeit and pay for every offence the sum of one dollar, to be recovered for the use of the Borough with costs of suit.

SECT. 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to carry, throw or deposit in any street, alley, or on any private ground, within the limits of this Borough, shavings, paper, hay, straw, stubble, vines, or any other combustible matter, except on the enclosed parts of his own private lot, and that for his own necessary use. If any person or persons shall offend against this section, he, she, or they, shall forfeit and pay the sum of two dollars to be recovered for the use of the Borough.

SECT. 4. If any person or persons shall at any time be found in any of the Streets or other parts of the Borough, behaving in a disorderly manner, and do not forthwith peaceably retire on being ordered so to do by the high Constable, the said high Constable shall forthwith arrest the said offender or offenders, and take him or them or either of them before the Burgess. If it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Burgess on his view or on confession of the offender or offenders, by the oath or affirmation of one or more lawful witness or witnesses, that the said person or persons did behave in a disorderly manner by insulting any person or persons passing the streets, or did make use of improper language, or profanity curse or swear, or interrupt the passage; every person thus lawfully convicted as aforesaid, shall suffer by fine not exceeding one dollar to be recovered with costs of suit for the use of the Borough.

SECT. 5. If any person or persons shall in any manner injure, break, dig up, remove, pull down or destroy any of the public buildings, lamps or lamp posts; or any other property, either public or private, within the limits of the Borough of Catsaunqua, or shall inquire, break, pull down, damage or destroy, any buildings, lamps or other property, belonging to the Corporation, such person or persons so offending, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, at the discretion of the Burgess before whom the same shall be tried, together with costs of suit, to be sued for and recovered by the Treasurer of the Borough and applied to and for the use of the said Borough with costs of suit.

SECT. 6. If any person after the publication of this ordinance, shall lead, ride or drive any animal, upon or over any of the paved footways within this Borough, he, or she, so offending shall forfeit and pay the sum of three dollars, to be recovered with costs of suit (by any person who will give information to the Burgess) for the use of the Borough.

SECT. 7. If any person shall wilfully place any obstruction on the streets, alleys and pavements, or footways as aforesaid, or upon any of the public parts of this Borough, except in the alleys as near the line as possible, every person so offending, shall forfeit and pay five cents and every such offence the sum of three dollars if such obstruction be found before his own lot or lot in his possession; and the sum of six dollars for each and every such offence, if found on any other public parts of this Borough; which said penalty shall be recovered for the use of the Borough with costs.

SECT. 8. Before said penalty shall be recoverable, it shall be the duty of the high Constable to notify the offender; and if the said obstructions are not removed within twelve hours if notified in the morning, or twenty-four hours if notified in the evening, then it shall be the duty of the high Constable to remove forthwith the obstructions after which he shall lodge information with the Burgess, and the offender in such case shall pay the above penalty with costs, and in addition thereto the costs of removal. The high Constable shall receive for every such information the sum of fifty cents to be paid out of the treasury of the Borough.

SECT. 9. Nothing contained in this ordinance shall be construed as to prevent any person whose daily occupation may require room, on any of the public parts of this Borough, for his work, if he be a tradesman; or for his wagons or other vehicle if he be a farmer or cartier, or any other necessary calling in any line to make free use of said public part of said Borough at any time, provided not obstructing the passage, nor to prevent persons from laying wood next the pavement for a reasonable time to have it saved and placed away, nor to prevent the dealers in Merchandise and others from placing boxes, barrels, or any thing in their line on the pavement close to their houses, so as to clear a free passage of at least four feet.

SECT. 10. If any person or persons shall travel on horseback or in a vehicle faster than at the rate of six miles an hour through any of the streets, lanes or alleys, of this Borough, every person or persons so offending shall forfeit and pay one dollar to be recovered with costs of suit, for the use of the Borough.

SECT. 11. It shall not be lawful for any Inkeeper, in the Borough of Catsaunqua, to permit any wagons, carriages, or other vehicles, to stand or remain in the street in the day time, in such position as to occupy more than one-third part thereof measuring from curb to curb; and any Inkeeper neglecting to observe the requirements of this section, or refusing to remove forthwith any wagon or other vehicle, so as aforesaid unlawfully placed, on being requested so to do, by any officer or citizen of this Borough, shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars, to be recovered for the use of the Borough with costs.

SECT. 12. And be it further ordained and enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that if any wagoner, cartier or driver of any carriage, sled or sleigh, or any other person, shall stop or place any such carriage, sled or sleigh, at or near the intersection of any street, lane or public alley within the limits aforesaid, in such manner as to cross the footway, or prevent foot passengers from crossing the street, lane or public alley, and shall not immediately on the request of the foot passenger, cause the same to be removed, or shall be absent therefrom, so that such request cannot be made, every person so offending shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the sum of one Dollar.
