WHEN, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dis-solve the political bonds which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind, requires that they, should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evidentthat all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. 'That Mo recure these rights, governments are inwhen any form of government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness-Prudence, indeed, will dictate, that governments long established, should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown, that mankind are most disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are inccustomed-But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same of ject, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former system of government .-The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurnations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these States. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the pub-

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operations till his assent should be obtained, and when so suspended he has utterly neglected to attend to

He has refused to pass other laws, for the accommodation of targe districts of people, unless those people would relinguish the right of representation in the legislature a right mestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legialative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distunt from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

: He has dissolved representative houses repentedly, for opposing with manly firm- under sixteen, \$40. ness his invasious on the rights of the peo-

'fle has refused, for a long time, after such dissolution, to cause others to be elected.; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the peo--ple at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the danger of invasion from without, and convulsions from within.

He has endeavored to prevent the populor that purpose obstructing the laws for the naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the condition of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by relusing his assent to laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has crected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of new officers, to harrass our people, and eat out their sub-

He has kept among us, in time of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil pow-

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction, foreign to our constitution, and acknowledged by our laws; giving is assent to their acts of pretented legisla-Lion.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of loreign mercenaries to complete the work of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy; scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongstius, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all nges, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppression, we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be

the ruler of a FREE PROPLE. Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British Brethern. We have warned them from time to time, of attempts made by their Legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstance of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usur pations, which would inevitably interrupt our connextion and correspondence. They to have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind—enemies in war—in peace, friends.

WE, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of cil-Council speeches, smoking the War-T. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm Green corn Dance, War Dance, Death reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other a Canoe, &c.
