

7. All persons who intend to exhibit horses, cattle, swine or sheep, or who intend to offer stock for sale, should notify the Secre-tary A. L. Ruhe, Esq., of such intention, on or before the 4th of October next, and leave with him a list and a full description of such stock in order that proper arrangements may be made for their accommodation.

8. Caution .- All articles exhibited, whethre eatables or not, must be respected as private property; and any person detected pur loining or injuring them, will be dealt with according to law. 9. All articles offered for competition must

be owned by the competitors, and all fruits, vegetables and flowers, must be the growth of the competitors.

10. Any article which receives a distinct premium, cannot compete in a general display, nor shall any one article receive two premjums.

12. Notice-All monies awarded as premiums shall revert to the Society unless called for within 60 days.

Instructions to Committees.
