NEW BUILDING MATERIAL. -The Cleveland Herald speaks of a new kind of bricks which nave been introduced there for building purpo-

18. They have the appearance of granite, and e made of sand and lime, the blocks being subjected to great pressure while in nearly a dry state. In size they are ten by four and five inches and hollowed, the indented part being seven by one and a half inches. After the bricks are formed into shape and pressed, they are subjected to the action of the atmosphere, and soon become as hard as rock, and insensible to the frost or rain. These bricks cost twenty dollars per thousand; but the inventors say they are cheaper than clay bricks that cost three dollars, because they furnish so smooth an interior surface that no plastering is necessary, and being hollowed, the walls do not require to be fired.

GREAT AGRICULTURAL SHOW IN BOSTON. The United States Agricultural Society, it will be remembered, is to give its third annual exhibition in Boston, commencing on the 23d instant, and closing on the 26th. The exhibition will be one of stock solely. The premium list amounts to \$10,000. The city of Boston has granted a square of fifty acres for the purpose of the exhibition.

AMERICAN POWDER.—The powder used by the allied armies in battering down the almost impregnable fortifications at Sebastopol was made at Hazard's and Dupont's mills, in Connecticut and Delaware. Two clipper ships belonging to Grinnell, Minturn & Co., were despatched, during the summer, with full cargoes of powder for the Crimea.

"THE KING OF THE PUMPKINS."-A curious custom prevails in Paris, of annually proclaiming the "king of the pumpkins," and of mocking a solemn procession in honor of the largest vegetable of the species which can be discovered. The "king" of the present year was grown at St. Mande, and weighed 348 pounds, being a little less than seven feet in curcumference.

THE VALUE OF A DEAD HORSE.-We understand that there die annually in the City of New-York about 12,000 horses, or 22 per day. Each dead horse is considered to be worth \$17 50. His hide is sold to the tanners for \$1 50, his bones are burned and sold to the sugar refiners for refining purposes, and to the farmers for manure, his meat is pressed and the grease used by the soap and candle makers, while the entrails and remnants are fed to the logs to make pork for hon e consumption.

SUITS AGAINST THE CAMDEN AND AMBOY RAIL-ROAD .- The parents of Baron St. Andre, late French Consul at Philadelphia, who was killed in the Burlington disaster, have commenced a suit for damages against the Camden and Amboy Railroad Company in the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. 
