Scaling Turtle.

The tortoise shell of commerce is merely the scales that cover the bony shield of the turtle. These scales are 13 in number, varying from an eighth to a quarter of an inch in thick ness. A large turtle will fur nish about eight pounds. To detach this shell from the living animal is a crucl process, which it made my flesh creep to witness. The fishers do not kill the turtle; did they do so, they in a few years would exterminate them. When the turtle is caught they fasten him, and cover his back with dry leaves or grass, to which they set fire. The heat causes the plates to separate at their joints. A large knife is then carefully inserted horizontally beneath them, and the lamin to lifted from the back, care being taken not to injure the shell by too much heat, nor to force it off until the heat has fully prepared it for separation. Many turtles die under this cruel operation, but instances are numerous in which they have been caught a second time, with the outer coating reproduced ; but in such cases, instead of 13 pieces, it is a single piece. Had the poor turtles the power of shricking, they would have made that barren island a very hell

Arab Oddities.

An Arab, entering a house, removes his shocs, but not his hat. He mounts his horse upon the right side, while his wife milks their cows upon the left side. With him, the point of a pin is its head, while its head is made its heel. His head must be wrapped up warm, even in summer, while his feet may well enough go naked in winter. Every article of merchandise which is liquid he weighs, but measures wheat barley, and a few other articles. He reads and writes from right to left, but figures are read from left to right.
