Cold Weather since 1797.

We quote below a recapitulation of cold weather for some years past, which we find in the Evening Bulletin, and which will no doubt prove interesting to our readers :

1797. From the year 1790 until 1797 the 1855. thermometor had not reached zero, during the month of January, in Philadelphia. In January, 1797, the mercury on two mornings was 5 degrees below zero at the Permanent Bridge. On the 9th, it got down to 13 degrees below, and upon the two subsequent mornings, it was 10 below zero. Horses with sleighs attached, were driven upon the ice upon the Delaware, from Trenton to Philadelphia.

1799. This year the Delaware was closed by ice from the 22d January, until past the middle of March.

1800. This winter, which lost but little of its severity before the 20th March, was remarkable for the extent of its snows, which fell as far South as New Orleans.

1805. In Philadelphia the mercury did no sink lower than 5 degrees above zero, but at Albany, Syracuse and Buffalo, the mercury was from 15 to 20 degrees below zero.

1810. Though not a severe January in America, the cold was during this month intense in Europe. At Moscow, the mercury sunk 40 degrees below zero and froze.

1815. On one morning the mercury was 7 below zero; on another 5, and on two others, 3. This winter was remarkable for the great suffering among the poor.
