RESOLUTION

Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

Remoted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

There shall be an additional article to said constiution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:-

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits of failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate unmaint of such debts disputed and authority whether penses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and lifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, sup-

DECITION 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, sup-press insurrection, defend the state in war, or to re-deem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of state; but the money arising from the contracting of such thebis, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Secrion 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Secrion 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay be accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two handred and fifty thousand dollars; which siaking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time awned by the state, or the proceeds of the safe of the same, or may part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, no required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of the shid sinking fund shall he used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any munaer, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association, or responsation, or responsation, or corporation.

Section 6. The commonwealth shall not assume

The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated dis-trict, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or
