Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representative Also of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General As-y and sembly rat, That the following amendments are pro-oud to posed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in posed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

PRINCE AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said consti-tution to be designated as article deven, as follows:—

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits of failures in revenues, or to meet ex-penses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more nets of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven bundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sucrion 2. In addition to the above limited power

the state may contract debts to repel invasion, sup-press insurrection, defend the state in war, or to re-deem the present outstanding indebtedness of the M. state: but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other
