THE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION BILL. The Exemption Bill just brought forward in the State Legislature provides that, in addition to the property now except by law from sale under execution, there shall be exempt by law, from levy and forced sale, under any execution for debts hereafter contracted, the lot. ecution for debts hereafter contracted, the lot and buildings thereon, occupied as a residence, and owned by the debtor, (being a householder and having a family,) to the value of \$1,000. Such exemption shall continue, after the death of such howeholder, for the benefit of the wider and family, some the penefit of the wider and family. dow and family, some or one of them continuing to occupy such homestead until the youngest child shall become 21 years of age, and until the death of the widow; and no release or waiver of such exemption shall be valid.

TEACHER'S INSTITUTE.—The eighth meeting of the second session of the Salisburg District Institute convened pursuant to previous public notice at Hofferd's School house on Saturday afternoon the 21st of January The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.
