

First, All animals get their nourishment

This may seem strange to those who think they "can not live" without beef or pork to "atick to their ribs," but is nevertheless an irrefutable fact. Liebig, Playfair, Boussingalt, and the best analytical chemists generally, have demonstrated that bread ice, all contain more than twice the quantity of solid matter, from three to six times more of the heat forming principle, and some as mush, and some more of the blood forming principles. Beef may be "concentrated nutrition" compared to grass and pumpkine, but it is a weak and watery nutrition compared to wheat. When you buy 100 pounds of flesh, you pay for from 68 to 75 pounds of water. In 100 pounds of wheat you get only about 15 pounds of water. In the same proportion of bears only 14 pounds, in corn meal only 10 pounds, and in rice only 7 pounds of water. Flosh contains more nourishment than apple , but, for wholesomeness, with our bread, give us plenty of good juicy apples. If we can not have the apples, or some other good vegutable substitute, we prefer to draw our supply of water, fresh from a spring or well rather then pay the butcher a big price for fever.
