#### THE FENIANS AT WORK! Reported Capture of Fort Eric.

New York, June 1.—It is reported that Fort Erie, in Canada, opposite Buffalo, was captur-ed by Fenians to-day. They are said to be 3,-000 strong, and 2,000 of them are said to be marching unopposed into the interior, and have already cut one telegraph line.

Buffalo, June 1-230 A. M.-The report ers of the Express have just returned from point one and a half miles below Lower Black Rock. The head of the Fenian column, 600 strong, had reached that point, with their ar-my train of nine wagons, loaded with ammunition. They declare they will effect a cross ing before daylight.

CINCINNATI, June 1.—A despatch from Columbus, Ohio, says that 450,000 rounds of am munition were shipped from that place to New York, 150,000 to Chicago, and 30,000 muskets to Buffalo within a few days. These arms, it is reported, are for the Fenians. Col. Joontoi, (?) late of Mosby's guerrillas, is with the party. Gen. Fitz Hugh Lee, late of the Robel army, will command the cavalry. It is reported that many of the men come from the Southern army. LATER.

On Saturday a fight occurred between the Fenians and Canadians near Ridgway. The Fenians were 1,000 strong, under Col. O'Neill. The Canadians were 1,400 strong, under Col. Bu chanan. After a short conflict the Canadian were put to flight. The Fenians lost 6 killed and 15 wounded, and the Canadians 23 killed and wounded in all.

The Fenians fought bravely, throwing of their coate, yests, and even shirts, and fighting half naked. After stopping the pursuit, the main body of Fenians proceeded toward Fort Erie, leaving a guard over the wounded of both

#### FARMER AND HOUSEKEEPER.

A NICE DISH FOR TEA -Pour boiling water on crackers; cover them: in'a short time they will swell and become soft. Boil some milk; add one egg, a little butter and salt take the crackers out of the water and pour the milk over them

To REMOVE IRON MOULDS.—1. Rub the spot with a little powdered exalic acid, or salts; of lemon, and warm water, let it remain a few minutes, and well ripse it in clear water. 2. Wash the spots with a strong solution of cream of tartar water; repeat, if necessary, and dry in the sun.

Lime and common coarse salt has a surprising effect upon the growth and yield of potatoes: in addition to the usual dressing of manure, apply the lime and salt mixture at the rate of a good handful to every three feet of the row, and the rows so treated yielded fully double the amount obtained from similar rows not so top-dressed.

Common brass Clocks may be cleaned by immersing the works in boiling water.— "Rough as this treatment may appear," he says, "it works well; and I have for many years past, boiled my clocks whenever they stopped from accumulation of dust or a thick ening of oil upon the pivots. They should be boiled in pure or rain water, and dried on a warm stove or near the fire.'

MANAGEMENT OF YOUNG CHICKENS, -- A writer in the New York Times, says: "When the chickens are hatched, if, betore taking them from the nest, you would oil the top of the heads of the chicks, you will destroy all the lice there are in the broad. for as soon as two or three chicks are hatched, all the lice upon the hen leave her and quarter themselves on the heads of the chicks, and the oil will kill them; and then, with clean quarters for the chicks on a start, and a thorough cleansing of the coop each week, you will not fail to raise

OILING LEATHER .- The Scientific American says that oils should not be applied to dry leather, as they would invariably injure it If you wish to oil a harness, wet it over night, cover it with a blanket and in the morning it will be dry and supple; then apply neat's foct oil in small quantities, and with so much el-bow grease as will insure its disceminating itself throughout the leather. A soft, pliant harness is easy to handle, and lasts longer than a neglected one. Never use vegetable oils on leather; and among animal oils, neat's

UNBOLTED FLOUR THE MOST HEALTHFUL .-Having been raised in a good wheat country, we cannot well overcome an early attachment to "mother's nice white bread." Yet science plainly teaches that the most healthful bread is that made from wheat ground without separating the bran. The coarsest portions of the bran keep the finer particles of flour separated, so that the gastric juice of the sto ach more readily penetrates and dissolves the mass, and hence is best for digestion. The coarser particles also promote the healthful action of the intestines, and prevent constipation, which is one of the prolific causes of discase in these days. It would be far better. doubtless, if every flour bolt was removed from our grist-mills, and people consumed the meal of the whole wheat kernels, just as the several parts combined naturally. Taste depends mostly upon habit: those accustomed to the unbolted flour eat it with a relish .-American Agriculturist.
