FARMER AND HOUSEKEEPER.

WASH FOR STIFF JOINTS -Salt brine is said to be the best wash for stiff joints in horses. It is also good for hard hoof, as it attracts moisture, and thus keeps the hoof soft. It can be easily tried by any farmer.

Is water convenient to your yards and stables for winter use? If not, in rememberance of the miles of snowy travel you and your stock have done, supply it now—bring down the spring from the hill-side, dig a well, or force up part of the stream below with the hydraulic ram.

How to Dress Poultry .- To do this Wendell's Poultry Guide gives us this advice: "Take a knife and sever the artery or jugular vein, in the neck, or take an axe and cut the head off, let it bleed so as to draw all the ever from the fowl in case it have any. Dis the body in boiling water, then pick quick, when through douse the fowl in hot water again, then throw it into a tub of cold water, let it remain three or four minutes, this will make it swell out plump, and will keep twenty four hours longer than if it was not thrown in the cold water.

ROASTING AND FRYING MEATS. - The English are acknowledged to be the best meats cooks in the world. They never allow any water or broth in the pan where the meat is The roast, from time to time, is basted with the drippings from the fat. In frying a steak or mutton-chop, the pan should become thor oughly heated before piacing the meat in it h should previously have been a asoned with penner and salt. The latter should not be applied till just before cooking, as it has a tendency to harden. The steak or chap should be turned constantly until it is done

Mulching trees is a matter of importance, and should generally be done in the fall. It serves as a great protection in winter, as well as manure to the roots. Mulching in the spring, or summer, has a tendency to keep prevent the fruit ripening in season. The proper time for mulching fruit trees with great succ as and satisfaction the roots growing too late in the fall and thus proper time for mulching fruit trees, vines. canes, of shrubs, is in the fall when the wood is rips or nearly so.
Apple or pear seeds may also be planted in

the fall, in the ground, or in boxes filled with earth. They will grow if planted in the spring, but will not succeed as well .- Rural

Our farmers should plant apple seeds and raise young trees, get the seeds from a sound native apple and plant in rows about three In this way fruit can be grown that will thrive well on our soil and stand the climite. It is a well known fact that young trees or grafts brought from other states do not produce healthy fruit.

CURING PORK AND HAMS .- A correspondent of the American Farmer, Rochester.

The management of pork and hams, though brought under the same head, is essontially and wholly different. We will begin in the very important item of curing hams A bright, sweetly flavored ham may at all times be obtained with a little care 16 pounds of ham to one pound of salt, and I ounce of saltpetre finely pulverized; rub them with this in some vessel until well in-corporated: then lay the hams on a shelf, or more convenient, in a barrel, placing on them the surplus salt: in a few days rub again, and it necessary again, until they have taken i al the ealt, when they are ready for smoking, which should be done before the flies make their appearance in the spring, and until they are quite dark, or almost black when they must be taken down, and sewed up in a close fitting cloth or bag, with paper doubled several thicknesses on the flesh side. Then tie closely, and hang up and give two or three costs of whitewash They may then hang in the garret all sum mer, or in any dry place. By observing this method they can be kept any length of time, unless they prove so excellent that you eat

Pork, though derived from the same animal, is of an entirely different taste, and re quires different management. In these days double refinement, it will be thought quite yalgar, we suppose, to give much attention to the curing of pork, and especially to advocate the enting of it. But where is there a family. in the days of flies and heat, who do not turn with disgust from all kinds of fresh meat, and open with pride a well-kept and well filled nork harrel, and if any meat is required, prefor it from these. Nay, say not that may do for furmers. Broiled and pre-pared in a peculiar munner by disping in wa-ter, it becomes a very delicate dish. The manuer of curing pork is very simple -a layer of pork, and a layer of sait, (course is the best,) then a strong brine (that will bear any egg) to fill up the barrel. The old brine may be boiled and scummed, and when cool fill up with that. It is of importance that the brine should be turned off in the spring, or before warm weather-as it will somewhat bloody-boiled and replaced.
