The nominations were made with less trouble than had been anticipated on account of the number and strength of the candidates for the nominations, and the ruling sentiment among both candidates and delegates seemed to be a desire to work for the best interests of the party. The vote for Auditor General stood as follows upon the first and only ballot which was taken: Dr. David Stanton of Beaver county, 95; Gen. Harrison Allen of Warren county, 22; Col. Francis S. Hooten of Chester county, 16. Dr. Stanton's nomination was at once made unanimous when the result of the balloting was an acounced, and he accepted the nomination in a modest and appropriate speech. The vote for Surveyor neral showed 87 votes for Col, Robert B. L. Smedley of Philadelphia, and the nomination of the former was immediately made unanimous. The main thing in the trial by jury is to have men judge the facts intelligently and decide the case impartially, and to does

not seem to be necessary that a man should be either notoriously ignorant or hopelessly stupid to enable him to make a faithful juryman. It seems to us that both the rights of the man to be tried and those of society will be better secured by having intelligent jurors than stupid ones, and in these days of the rapid spread of information we shall pretty soon have to amend our provisions for the selection of jurors or be content to have all our important cases tried by men whose only recommendation is their stolld stupidity and indifference to passing events. A good case in point is that of the recent murder of Mr. Putnam of New York, one of the most brutal and causeless crimes which have ever been committed in that city where brutal and unprovoked murders are no rarity. Mr. Putnam, a respectable merchant, was riding in a street car, having under his protection a lady friend and her daugter. A drunken boor on the tront platform, named William Foster, offered some personal indignities to the ladies


