CANADA.

The troubles in Canada have again commenced. The Patriots have arisen in considerable numbers in different sections of the country, and some fighting has already been had, which has resulted against the Patriots. Although the Patriots appear to have an organized opposition to the Government, yet we do not think, from all secounts, that they have any chance of success. The 'revolution will undoubtedly soon be quelled, and hanging, banishing and fleeing from the country will again be the consequence.

NEW YORK ELECTION.

Contrary to the expectations of every one, the election in the State of New York has gone for the Whigs. They have elected their Governor, Lieut. Governor, a majority of the members of Congress, and a majority of the house of Representatives. but the Democrats have still a majority of the Senate.

BREACH IN THE CANAL.

We understand that a very serious breach has occurred in the Canal a short distance above Cattawissa bridge, Several hands are now employed in repairing it, but it is not expected to be completed under several days. We are informed, that the breach has been caused by the negligence of the Supervisor in not stopping a leak which has for some time past been increasing in the bank where it has now made such havoe. Much inconveniece and damage will probably arise to boatmen and their employers, in consequence of the breach, as large quantities of coal, iron ore and merchandize are now laying above and below the breach, for should the canal be closed by ice before the repairs are completed, which is very probable, they will be compelled to remain where they are through the winter, or be transported by land, at a great expense, to their place of destination.

The Wheeling Gazette states that the difference between the highest point attained by the water at the flood of 1802, and the lowest point to which it has been this season, is just forty-four feet, four and a quarter inches, as ascertained by actual measurement.

"The River and the Weather."-Under this head the Pittsburg Gazette of Monday afternoon states that they had a good deal of rain lately in that region, that the appearances indicated more, and that it expected to see the river in good navigable condition by Wednesday or Thursday.
