CANADA.

The troubles in Canada have again commenced. The Patriots have arisen in considerable numbers in different sections of the country, and some fighting has already been had, which has resulted against the Patriots.

NEW YORK ELECTION.

Contrary to the expectations of every one, the election in the State of New York has gone for the Whigs. They have elected their Governor, Lieut. Governor, a majority of the members of Congress, and a majority of the house of Representatives.

BREACH IN THE CANAL.

We understand that a very serious breach has occurred in the Canal a short distance above Cattawissa bridge. Several hands are now employed in repairing it, but it is not expected to be completed under several days.
