Information in the nature of quo wa
hio, and ordered by the Supreme Cour o a Jury to try questions of fact to inform
The proceeding in this interesting caus founded upon the statutory powes give the Supreme Court declaritory to the ommon law, by net of Assembly of Penn glvania passed 14th of June, 1836, entied "an act rolating to writs of quo war ranto and mandamus. That act provides hat the writ of quo warranto may issue in a designated description of cases, among which is the present viz: " In case any question shall arise concerning the exercise of any office in any corporation created by authority of law," \&ce, and "in case any association or number of persons shall ex arcise any of the franchises or privileges of corporation within the respective county without lawful authority,"
On the 20th of May, 1838, on relation of the complainants, it was suggested to the Supreme court that the defendants were
since the 24th May, 1838, exercising and did still exercise the franchises and privil ges of corporators without lawful authori$y$, viz: the franohises and privileges of rustees of a certain corporation called and nown by the name of "Trustees of the Ceneral Assembly of the Preabyterian Church in the United States of America;" hat on said 24th May, 1838, the relatora were duly elected trustees of the said cor poration, agreeably to the provisions of the act of 28 th March, 1799 , incorporating said ody. but notwihstanding said elect on the efendants still usurped said office, and praying for process of law stc.
On the 31st July, 1838, the defendante
put in separate answers : that of Asahel Green asserted that he was one of the or ginal trustees and had ever since acted as wuch and denying the election of the Relators, \& claiming that hir right av truatee had never been vacated,determined or abridged; and that ofT. Bradiford, alleging that on the 7h May, 1822, he was duly elected by the General Assembly a trustee, and had ever since acted as such; also denying the election the relators and asserting his presat right.
On the 10th October, 1838, the relator eplied to the plea of Asahel Green, that rue it was he was originally a rustee of e General Assembly, but that by an act of incorporation, the corporate body had power to change one third of the whole ody of 18 trustees, as often as they should hold their sessions, and that, in exercise of May, 1838 , and body cid on the 17 th ity, duly elect Asvembly held in thia sahel Giect James Todd in place of the epted asid office, and thereby the aid General Assembly avowed, disfranchised and discharged the said Asahel Green, \&e and thun replied to the plea of Thoma Bradford, in like form alledging that George W. M'Clelland was duly elected in his lace, \&ec. In like form, the relator as erted that Thomas Fleming was elected in lieu of Cornelius C. Cuyler, and Wil iam Darling in liea of Solomon Allen.William Laus was not summoned, and his right, opposed to that of P. A. Raybold, is only incindentally in question. In the pleadingu the several parties appealed to the country, viz a jury trial, and the issoe or fact became ripe for a trial on the 7 Nov. 1838
Accordingly, a jury was empannelled on he second Monday of March, 1839, and charged to enquire of the matters of fact concaled in the pleadinge, Tho relator were represenied on the trial by Josial Randall, IF. M. Meredith, \& George Wood, Esqrs. -the defendants by F. W. Hubbell, J. R. Ingersoll, John Sergeant and W. C. Preston, Esqra.
