Whereas our Senator, S. F. Headley, Est, has brought forward a bill in the senate of this state which, if it should become a law, will take about one third of the terrilory of this county to be included in a new county, to be called Madison, sgainet the known and expressed will of a large body of his constituents. It therefore, becomes the imperative duty of those opposed to a reduction of the territory of this county, to speak in such language as can be eatily understood by all concerned. Then, is a citizen of that portion of Columbia county which would be included in the new rounty and as an American citizen. I claim the right to be heard upon this question, which is of the utmost importance to the present as well as future generations. What advantage then would the inhabitants of Bugarloaf and Fishing creek townships derive from this proposed measure? A's one being acquainted with their geography 1 answer,

Have they sought for such a measure! -Let the voice of their citizens be heard, as they spoke through the ballot box at the last October Election, when this important question was fairly before the people of this county. And what did that voice say? Did it say Division? No. But every voter who resided in Fishing creek township said Removal; and went the Whole removal ticket, and the two Division votes that were given, were given by two young men from Valley township, and this our Senator, Mr. Headly, well knows. With what face can be then say in the Senate of this State that we are in favor of a Division. Surely he must have lost all sense of duty and honesty before he could make such a statement.

To any man knowing the geography of this county, and who was not governed solely by selfish motives, it would appear incredible to suppose that the inhabitants desired a division, as the main road leading from Coles Mill to Bloomsburg, runs directly through Sugarloaf, Fishing creek, and Orange, and upon this is brought the produce of the farmer. And then there is the big Fishing creek; a noble stream of water, running through the same section of country upon whose bosom is floating thousand of Test of boards besides immense quantities of rails and other timber yearly. So that take the matter as you please, you find that Bioomsburg is the natural Depot of the county of Columbia. From thence are barried into the county larger quantities of sait, Iron, and plaster, than from any other town in the county. Why then should my be so wilfully blind as not to see, that all the trade from all that section of county above Bloom, must flow through this natural channel, and either by land or water carriage, seek an out-let to distant markets by possing through Rloom. While the Berwick, is to pass down the valley of Fisking creek, until within five miles of Bloomsburg, and then strike a cross a rough and hilly tract of country, a distance of thirteen miles to Berwick Would any of thirteen miles to Berwick man in his right mind, thus madly seek to burden himself and properity, with a load of inconveniencies which have no advantages to offer.

A division of this county is a measure which would entail heavier burdens upon that portion of the inhabitants residing within the limits of the new county, than they are able or willing to bear, or are willing to see brought upon their children. Their burden in attendence to and support of our unjustly located county town, are great, and have been long endured, but to add'to all this, the insultingly oppression of a Division of an already small county is too intolerable. And that public servant who has derived his authority from the people, whom he thus insults, deserves to be branded with the brand of infamy as visible as the marks of cain. What are we to say then of the man who dates thus in the hall of Legislation, to wilfully, willingly, and knowingly misrepresent those who gave him power after repeatedly pledging himself to sustain the wishes of his constituents, when that will be properly expressed.

Can confidence be placed in such an individual? Can he place any confidence in himself? Can even those whom he now seems to favor, trust him for a moment, when they see how disgrarefully he abandons his colors, and betrays the cause, he has so often pledged himself to main

ANOTHER MURDER.

A horrid Murder occurred in New York on Monday night, the perticulars of which we gather principally from the Tribune. That paper says:

"All our readers doubtless remember the attempt, mentioned some days since, of Mr. Henry Colton, of No. 24 Verey street, to shoot Mr. Charles Corlies in Leonard street. The pistol then merely snapped, and Colton was arrested. He was bailed, and has since been at liberty. A day or two after this, the wife of Colton made an unsuccessful attempt to commit spicide by taking laudanum. This added strength to the rumor we had previously heard that the assault of Colton was made in consequence of the alleged seduction of his wife by Carlies.

Last evening at a few minutes before ? 'clock, Mr. Corlies was seen to come out of his Bowling Saloon, under Kreemer & Co.'s coach establishment in Broadway near Franklin street, in company with a woman. He passed down Broadway to Leonard street, down which he turned and proceeded towards his residence at No. 100 He was there last seen standing still and in conversation with a woman. A moment or two after the explosion of a pistol was heard, and a passer by in Broadway saw a man fall-but saw no one near him. On going to him; Mr. Cottles was found to have been shot. A ball had entered the back of his bead, and on examination it is supposed to have lodged just behind the nose. He was speechless when found, and so remained. Portions of his brain escaped through the wound, and was immediately taken into a foom in the Carleton House, and attended by physicians. When we left he was still living; but died at a little after pine.

Officers immediately went after Mr Colton, who was found at his house; and taken into custody. He surrendered him-self without the slighteer hesitation, and denied all knowledge of the transaction. Colton has for a long time kept a genteel gambling establishment at his residence. Jorlies is a single man and boarded at No. 100 Leonard street.'

Mrs. Colton has also been strested and committed to the tombs. At this time of her arrest she was found in a garret room. insune or affecting to be so. It is stated that during the early part of the evening, a woman called at the boarding house of Mr. Corlies, in Leonard street, and inquired for him, but was informed he was not in. She walked some distance into the hall of the house, and when the bonnet and green veil that was found in the apartments of Mrs. Colton, at 26 Vesey street, were shown to the female of the house, who saw the person that called, she identified them as the same as worn by her. Mr. Robinson also identified them as the same worn by the woman who cause into the saloon.

John Adams, who resides in Church street, opposite St. Paul's church yard,near Vesey, says he saw a woman come out of the house No. 26 Vessy street, where Mrs. Colton resides, about half past six in the evening, whose dress resembled that worn by the woman who was seen with Cor-

lies. It is stated by Corlies's bar keeper that at about half past six o'clock in the evening while he and Corlies were seated in the saloon, reading a letter, they heard a tap at the door, which was opened, and a female entered, dressed in a cloak, straw hat, and we should shun as we would a deadly green veil. As soon as Curlies saw her; raised both his hands in an attitude signifring his wish for her to go away. The woman came in closely veiled, and took a seat on the sofa, where she remained in close conversation, until several gentleman entered the saloon to play ten-pins, when they got up, and went out together. As he was going, Robinson touched him with his finger, and said, 'Is that Mrs. Cohon?' Corlies made no reply but left the saloon.
