PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE.

There are 48 farmers in our State Legis-
lature, 21 attorneys, 8 merchants 6 mechan-
ics, 5 physicians, 3 teachers. The re-
mainder are of various professions. In the
house, composed as it is of one hundred
persons, there is the extraordinary number
of twenty-two bachelors, the greater por-
tion of whom are gray headed.

FIENDISH BARBARY.

We read sometimes of cruelty and bar-
barity practised towards slaves, but the
New Orleans Bee has an account of a case
in which a female slave kept her mistress,
and the children of the latter confined, and
treated them with the most horrid cruelty.
An anonymous letter informed the Mayor
of that city of the fact.

The Mayor, accompanied by Recorder
Genois and some officers of the public, im-
mediately repaired to the spot designated
in the letter, where they found Mrs. Rab-
beck, the lady of the house with three
of her children, aged seven, four and two
years, confined in a back cabinet of them
in a most horrid condition; dressed in rags
covered with dirt, and so emaciated, that it
appeared astonishing that they could sup-
port life. The body of Mrs. R. was covered
with bruises from her head to her feet
and in many places showed marks where
the instruments of floggation had broken
the skin. Both of her eyes were blackened
and her hair was matted with blood. The
three children presented nearly the same
shocking condition, the two eldest in par-
ticular. Her husband, she stated, had been
absent on a visit to Missouri for the last six
weeks, since which time Pauline, the slave
had taken possession of her keys and bed-
room, and confined herself and children to
her (Pauline's) room, where they had been
beaten almost daily by Pauline with a can-
cer or stop, and been furnished with barely
sufficient food to support life. Medical ad-
vice and attention were immediately furnished
by the Mayor, and the negro Pauline
arrested and committed to prison to await
examination before Recorder Genois. The
penalty of the charges preferred against her
if found guilty, under the Black Code, is death.
It is stated that the husband of the
woman had instigated his slave, who was
also his paramour, to the commission of this
horrid outrage.
