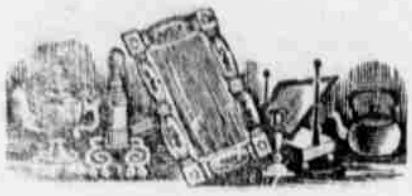

TAX COLLECTORS AND TAXPAYERS

In consequence of a Circular, lately issued by the State Treasurer, directing that the State Tax still remaining unpaid, for the present and former years, must be paid into the State Treasury, on or before the second Tuesday in January next, and that every county, failing to pay its portion of State Taxes, shall be, after that time charged an interest of five per cent, on such amount as shall remain unpaid, and payments from the State Treasury, for school or other purposes withheld, until such balance with interest is fully paid; we are under the necessity of requiring the several Tax Collectors of Columbia County, to collect and pay into the county Treasury, on or before the third Monday of November next, ALL the State Taxes for former years which still remain unpaid.

The promptness with which our former Circulars were responded to, both by Tax Collectors and Taxpayers, by which the county Treasurer was enabled to pay into the State Treasury at that time required the whole amount of State Tax due for this county, for the present year, induces us to believe that Columbia county's will not, on the second Tuesday of January next, be found among the defaulters.
