

The Washington correspondent of the York Gazette, under date of 21st inst. says:

### IMPORTANT RUMORS.

Mr. Saulnier, direct from Vera Cruz, arrived last night, and brings despatches from Mr. Slidel, our minister extraordinary to Mexico. California may be bought of Mexico for \$15,000,000 — not when I say may be bought, I probably do not speak in the right sense — perhaps I should say has been bought conditionally, by the U. S. government! Gen. Pareis, commander in chief of the Mexican force raised against the U. States, has declared war against the Mexican government.

Letter writers at Washington assert that Mr. Benton intended at the commencement of this week to bring in a bill for the organization of an army of two hundred thousand men, and the authorization of a war loan of \$10,000,000 to prepare the country for any contingency that may grow out of the Oregon question.

Well, they are great on a tale in the West. They say that the skeleton of a man which was recently dug up in Tennessee about 18 feet high, and must have stood 19 feet. The bones of the thigh and leg measure 6 feet 6 inches. The skull is described as being about two-thirds the size of a flour barrel and capable of holding in its cavities near two bushels.

The English Navy has 282 ships. In case of war, the United States has 100,000 fishermen, who will man 284 ships and bring in less than it would take to obtain volunteers for one man of war from Woolwich dock-yard.

The venerable Mrs. Rochester, from whose family the flourishing city of Rochester (N. Y.) derives its name, died at that place last week. The authorities and citizens honored her memory by a public funeral, which was attended on Thursday.

Mr. I. Johnson fell dead in Providence on Sunday afternoon, while in an odd felons' procession, attending the remains of a deceased brother to the tomb.

### OREGON.

The conclusive testimony of the American title, and the ability with which that title has been maintained by the Secretary of State, Pennsylvania's own Buchanan, is admitted on all hands. Even the New York Herald's correspondent, well known as one of the ablest men of his day, and as having been bitterly prejudiced against Mr. Buchanan, as his former letters prove, says in a recent communication in relation to this matter:

'Every body seems to be astonished at the wonderful character of Polk's policy — Buchanan deserves a part of the credit, and he will have it; and when his correspondence with the British minister is made public, every body will be more astonished than ever. He is at the present time beyond all doubt, the ablest diplomatist in the democratic party. I am not quite certain whether he is not, after all, the first in the country. Webster is great, but he lacks some of the qualities that adorn the iron-monger — Calhoun is a magnificent statesman, but he is greater in the forum than anywhere else. At any rate, both Mr. Polk and Buchanan will gain more credit by this movement than they won before. Parties are suddenly arrested — cliques are astounded — and, in less than ten days some movements will be set on foot here which are now little expected.'
