TREASURER'S SALE OF UNSEATED LANDS.

Agreeably to the provisions of an Act of Assembly, entitled An Act directing the mode of selling unseated lands for taxes, and for other purposes, passed the 13th day of May, 1816, and the further supplement thereto passed on the 13th day of March 1817, and the 25th of March, 1831, the Treasurer of Columbia County hereby gives notice to all persons concerned therein, that unless the Taxes due on the following tracts of Unseated Land situated in Columbia County are paid before the day of sale, the whole or such parts of each tract as will pay the taxes and costs chargeable thereon, will be sold at the Court House in the town of Danville, County of Columbia, on the second Monday in June next, and be continued by adjournment from day to day, for arreages of Taxes due said County, and the Costs accrued on each respectively.
