OREGON.
The accounts from Washington, are, that the British Minister has made a proposition to our government to settle this question on the basis of the 49th, and that the President had sent the proposition to the Senate for advice—the Senate had advised to its acceptance by a vote of 38 to 12—that a treaty had been made upon that basis and is now before the Senate for its ratification. The correspondent of the Public Ledger, in speaking upon the subject says—
The proposition submitted to the Senate did not consist of general heads merely for an arrangement, but is in effect the full draft of proposed conventions which draft was assented to by the Senate without alteration. The treaty to be sent in will be conformably thereto—fixing the 49th parallel as the boundary between the territories of the two countries, from the point of that parallel where the present boundary terminates to the middle of the Sound or channel that divides Vancouver's Island from the continent, thence along the middle of that channel, and Southwardly and Westwardly through the Straits of Fuca to the Pacific. The navigation of this Sound or Bay to be open to both parties, and the navigation of the Columbia up to Main Strait, and up its North Branch to the 49th parallel of latitude to be free to the Hudson's Bay Company. The terms alluded to by Great Britain are not quite so favorable as those offered by Mr. Gallatin in 1827.

Mr. Walker's response to the call of the Senate, on the subject of finances and the Tariff, will also be submitted this morning.
In 'Folsom's Mexico,' printed in New York in 1842, it is mentioned that a steamboat ascended the Rio del Norte in 1829, above Camargo (200 miles) nearly to Ravilla, about 300 miles from its mouth.
