

not shall not be confirmed unless the same shall be paid first by the petitioners.

And then, by the 10th Section of an Act passed 10th April 1845, the foregoing act is extended to the county of Columbia, as follows:-

SECTION 10. That the provisions of the first, second, third and fourth sections of an act, entitled 'An Act relative to public roads in certain counties therein named,' passed the 24th day February, A. D. 1845, be and they are hereby extended to the county of Columbia.

Pamphlet Laws 1845, page 288.
The duties of Viewers under the foregoing law are clearly pointed out, and may be easily understood.

Notice. Under 2d Sect. act of 1845, any one or all the viewers shall give the public notice therein mentioned, in the following cases:

1. In all cases of a view of a public or private road.

2. In all cases of a Review of a public road.

And the viewers or reviewers, as the case may be, should set forth in their report to the Court, that such notice was given in cases where it is necessary.

RELEASES. These are only to be procured in case of a public road; by viewers to lay out such public road if they report in favor, or by reviewers in case they report in favor of a change of location in the road they were appointed to review. The Releases should be under seal and in favor of the county.

DAMAGES. In assessing damages the viewers or reviewers, we suppose, are to take into consideration the advantages derived from such road passing through the land of the person claiming damages as provided by 9th Sect. act of 13 June 1836, relating to roads, highways and bridges. And damages are to be allowed not for the soil itself, but only a right of passage over it by the public. It is the duty of the viewers or reviewers to take into consideration as well the possibility of the road reverting back to the proprietor of the soil, by being vacated at some future day, as the rights left to him under and over the highway in subservience to the public passage; and also, the advantages derived by the owner from the road passing through his premises, which in some instances makes the residue more valuable than the whole was before, and in most cases gives increased value to the remainder. In some instances however, the total value of land taken may be lost.

These are considerations which Viewers &c. should weigh in determining the question in regard to damages. (9 Waits 177-8.)

It will make no difference in allowing damages, whether the claimant for them is a petitioner for the road or not. (Ib.)

It is the duty of the viewers or reviewers in a first place, to procure releases if possible, and this provision being for the protection of the county treasury, should be scrupulously obeyed.

Great care and judgment should be observed in the assessment of damages, as it seems that the court must reject the road altogether (unless the petitioners for the road will pay them) or allow the damages assessed out of the county treasury. The court, it seems, cannot appoint a view for reassessment of damages.
