

Military Members of Congress.—In the house of Congress are 27 members who hold, in name, if not in commission, military title above the rank of captain: 15 Generals, 11 Colonels, and a Major. In the Senate there are Generals Houston and Rank, and Lieutenant Colonel Benton. The Clerk of the House is a Major—and the President himself was a Colonel.

The Heroine of Tampico.—A subscription has been set on foot at New Orleans to collect a sum sufficient to purchase, for Mrs. Chase, a service of plate. This is the lady who first set alight the stars and stripes at Tampico and so wrought upon the Mexicans' fears that they abandoned the town, and left a bloodless conquest to Com. Conner. She deserves some testimonial for her conduct and the ladies have originated this mode of rewarding her patriotism.

James M. Mason, Esq. has been elected U. S. Senator in the place of Mr. Pennypacker, deceased. Mr. Mason is a Democrat and will give a hearty support to the Administration.

Reports from the army are various and contradictory, the latest is, that Gen. Quitman had had a battle with Gen. Urrea at Victoria, and came off victorious. Gen. Quitman had 2000 men, and Gen. Urrea had 12,000. Later accounts however make no mention of it.

THE ARMY AND NAVY.
From the Washington Union Jan. 21.
Several misstatements are now in circulation in the newspapers. Such is that Gen. Taylor was recalled from the army of Mexico, and that he has been ordered to Washington. Such, too, is the rumor, said to be founded on the authority of Commodore Perry, that the Castle of San Juan de Ulloa is not to be attacked, and also that Commodore Perry will not return to the Gulf of Mexico? Such, too, is the rumor that 'government is in possession of the ultimate conditions on which Mexico will consent to make a peace with the United States, and that has determined to accede to them, if Congress will enable the Executive to meet the views of Mexico.' We know not upon what authority these things have been reported we do not believe there is any adequate authority or foundation for either of the statements.

The Wife's Money.—There is before the Legislature of New Jersey, an application for the establishment of a Savings Bank of Newark, which includes the provision that any married woman may, in her own name, deposit money earned by her own labor, or received from others than her husband, the deposits and interest to be payable to her free of claim of her husband or his creditors.

Shells.—The Albany Journal says:—Since the 18th of December, 38,649 shells have been despatched from the Greenbush Depot, by railroad, to New York. These shells, when they leave the depot, have cost the government \$3 87 cents each, making the sum of \$110,871 63.

The habeas corpus disease has made its appearance among the Massachusetts regiment of volunteers. Two or three have already been carried off by it.

The Bellast (Me.) Journal states that a slight shock of an earthquake was felt in Lincolnville and Camden, a few days since.

Candidate for the Presidency.—The Pittsburg American publishes a call for a meeting of the Anti-masonic and Whig citizens, friendly to the nomination of the Hon. John McLean, of Ohio, for President of the U. S. It is signed by over four hundred names, including many of the American, nearly all the prominent Whig names of that city.

The new York Sun says:—The city is flooded with dimes, quarter and half dollars, made of base metals, and easily detected by their leaden sound. The half dollars are dated 1840, and the dimes 1843. The latter are badly stamped on the edge.
