

An Extraordinary Spectacle - Singular Condition of a Human Body.
The New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger, relates the following singular spectacle:

I have just returned from witnessing one of the most extraordinary spectacles - the most extraordinary of its kind that I ever beheld. It was no less a sight than a body of a fine, matronly old lady, a Mrs. Friend, who, at the age of 68 years, was 17 years ago interred in the grave-yard at the corner of Broadway and Twelfth street, from which the bodies are now being removed, for the purposes of speculation in and 'improvement' of the land. Early last week the body of this old lady was taken up, and before reinterment, her son, Frederick Friend, who was superintending the removal, under the impulse of the religious love of his mother, which he had ever felt, and which he had received a melancholy quickening by the sad duty he was performing, loosened and raised the lid of her wholly undecayed coffin, for the purpose of taking a view of what might remain of the face of her he had so loved on earth.

What was his astonishment to find that face as untouched by decay as it was the day she died, with the exception of the sunken eyes - not even soiled by a tint of corruption, but, on the contrary, retaining all the fulness it possessed when he had last viewed it, and entirely unchanged, except that the skin had become as white, pure and smooth as an infant's and apparently glazed over so as to perfectly represent white satin, over the whole was a thick covering of filmy mould. Astonishment overcame him, and all who first witnessed the marvel. On applying his hand to her face, he found it firm, and about the consistency of the hardest tallow, or sperm; and upon examination, after he had removed the body to his house, No. 48 Ludlow street, her whole person was found to be in the same astonishing condition. He immediately obtained an outer coffin, with a large glass top over the whole, into which the body was placed and in which it now remains, retaining the same astonishing appearance and condition which it presented when first exhibited.

When first exposed to the atmosphere the skin of the face was removed in spots from which the mould had its whiteness and turned almost black, but has slightly recovered its whiteness since it has been protected in the new coffin. Her husband and several children were buried around, but these, as well as more than 2,000 others buried in the same yard, underwent the natural process of decay. The bones appear to have become incorporated in substance with the fish, which, upon being probed, presented much the appearance of dry tallow, or dry cheese. I understand that some of our most celebrated physicians are making this singularly the subject of profound scientific investigation.

REMOVAL BILL PASSED!

We learn from Harrisburg, that the Bill submitting the question of the removal of the Seat of Justice from Oriskany to Potsville, to the people, passed the Senate on Wednesday last, almost unanimously, 22 to 5. The provisions of the Bill, as far as we can learn, are these: Should the people decide in favor of the removal, the Court House and the Public Offices, are to be erected by Potsville. As a new Jail is considered necessary, under any circumstances, the bill provides that the Jail is to be erected at the expense of the County. The present Public Buildings are appropriated to the Borough of Oriskany, for a College - *Miners Journal.*
