A Home for these, O God, to-day, For blessings at thy feet we lay And may its shelter, humbly given, Be but a far-off door to Heaven.

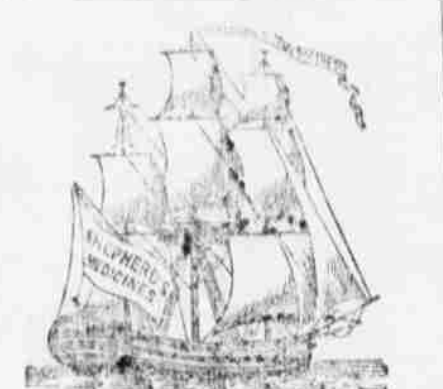

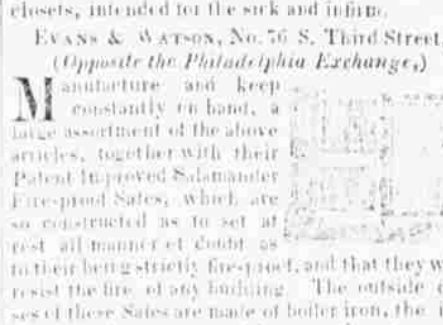
