The State Sinking Fund.

One of the most important acts of the recent Legislature, is the creation of a Sinking fund for the payment of the State Dabt. The first section of this act sets apart a specific fund to purchase bonds; the 2d section, designating the sources of revenue to be appropriated to this purpose, is as follows,

SECTION 2. That all revenue derived from the following sources, to wit: the taxes on collateral inheritances, and the precentage assessed upon any bank or railroad, or coal mining, or railroad ter, all taxes assessed on distilleries and breweries, or billiard rooms, bowling saloons and ten F.
