Wire Fences.

FIVE EXECUTIONS IN ONE DAY.—Last Friday, was a day worthy of Commemoration as to which five men were executed for capital offences. In Charleston, three negroes named Nicholas, John and George, were hung for a petty disturbance in the city workhouse, only a week previous. In Baltimore, Conrad Venter was hung for the murder of Mrs. Cooper, and in New York, Matthew Wood, was hung for the murder of his wife.

THE Indians State Gazette related the following beautiful and touching anecdote: We shall always recollect the interview between Andrew Jackson and James K. Polk, when the latter was about to leave for Washington, in the winter of 1845. The old hero then consoled his friend, and bid him a last adieu.—He raised his wasted form erect, and seized James K. Polk by the hand, and said: "Farewell, my friend, I shall never see you again in this world. Do your duty like a man, and we shall meet in heaven."

CHOLERA.—The London Board of health has published the following receipt in the case of premonitory diarrhoea:—For a solid, twenty grains of opiate confection, mixed with two table-spoonfuls of pepper-mint water, or with a little weak brandy and water, and repeated every three or four hours, or often if the attack is severe, until the looseness of the bowels is stopped; or an ounce of the compound chalk mixture, with ten or fifteen grains of the aromatic confection, and from five to ten drops of laudanum, repeated in the same manner. From half a drachm to a drachm of tincture of catechu may be added to this if the attack be severe. It is recommended to repeat these remedies night and morning for some days after the looseness of the bowels has been stopped.

but, in all cases, it is desirable, when practicable, that, even in the earliest stage of the disorder, recourse should be to medical advice on the spot. The last prescription is the best. In case premonitory symptoms, apply to the medical man in whom you have confidence, and act likewise the bowels. Laugh, joke, however poor: serve God, and, fear Cholera will soon leave us.
